DETROIT, Nov. 27.—(AP)—Detroit Red Wings kept Chicago Black Hawks from the National Hockey League lead tonight by winning 4-1, in a rough-and-tumble brawl before 6,436 spectators.

The Red Wings, recording their first victory on home ice this season, gathered a pair of goals in each of the last two periods for their biggest scoring spree of the year.

Chicago's lone score came in the last minute of the first period when John Mariucci's 50-foot shot earned off the leg of Detroit's Syd Howe and into the cage.

Aside from the scoring the two clubs belted each other around in a neighborhood brawl, and Referee Frank (King) Clancy chased off six players the first period, five in the second and three in the third.

Mariucci and Defenceman Jimmy Oriando of Detroit, rapidly building up one of hockey's major personal feuds, nearly came to blows at the penalty box in the wild second period.

Bruins Defeat Americans 6-4 In Overtime To Climb Into Tie With Maple Leafs

NEW YORK, Nov. 27.—(CP)—The other. Boston Bruins scored four goals in overtime to turn a close match into a rout in defeating Brooklyn Americans 6-2 before 10,672 fans at Madison Square Garden tonight.

The victory lifted Boston into a tie with the idle Toronto Maple Leafs for first place in the National Hockey League race.

The game, a grudge match featured by two fist fights in the second period, cost Manager Red Dutton of the Americans an automatic fine of \$100 in the third period when he dashed headlong on the ice to protest a decision by Linesman Fred Stevenson.

Bobby Bauer at that point scored the goal that gave Boston a lead of 2-1 but Dutton asserted that the play at the blue line—Dumont to Schmidt—which preceded Bauer's shot was offside. The fiery manager grabbed Stevenson's jersey in his rage and also argued fiercely with Referee Norman Lamport, but to no avail.

While Boston usually outplays the Americans by a wide margin, that was not the case tonight. The Americans held the offensive edge throughout the regular time and except for a defensive lapse by Defenceman Andy Branigan in the second period might well have won it. Branigan cleared the puck directly on Bill Cowley's stick and the Bruin centre quickly streaked a 50-foot shot into the corner of the overtime.

Two goals by Fred Thurier, young Brooklyn centre, equalized these two Boston counters. But a few seconds before the third period ended Branigan drew a holding penalty and Boston had a man advantage for the first two minutes of the overtime.

They made it good, Bauer scoring his second goal of the night for the winning margin, a backhand shot to the centre of the cage on plays with Milt Schmidt and Dick Clapper.

Then, with the Americans scrambling to wipe out the margin, the Bruins kept breaking away for counters. Jack Crawford, Roy Conacher and Red Hamill all caging the puck behind the exasperated Earl Robertson.

The second period fight brought major penalties to Bill Hollett and Bill Benson for one scrap and to Buzz Boll and Dutch Hiller for another.

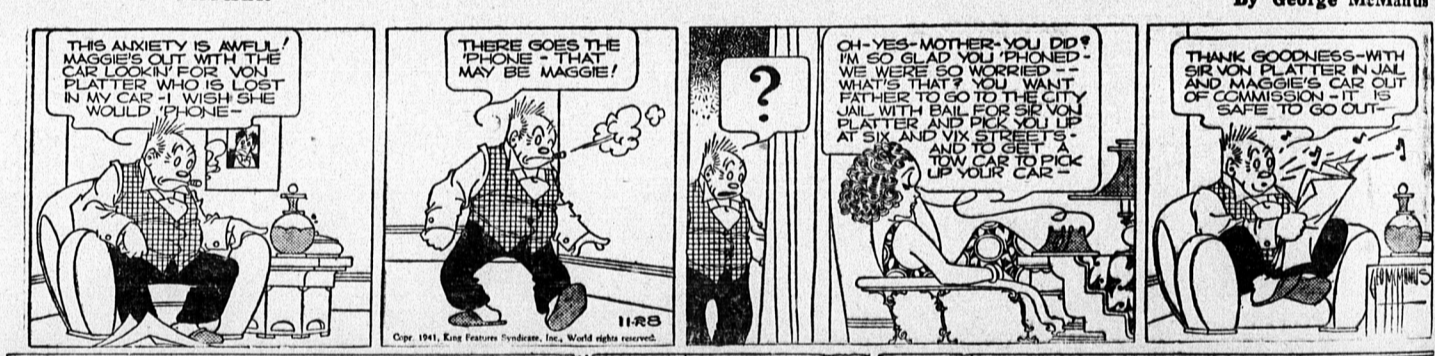
Wee Griddle
