And this, then, is a little talk about better Wall Decorations

COLORS in all fabrics have of late years shown a marked tendency toward improvement—soft mezzo tints having found, it seems, a permanent place in popular fancy. Wall papers nowadays are real dreams of art, designed by true artists, with the proper feeling for tone and right ideas of decoration.

Every period, clime and decorative school is ransacked for worthy inspirations and examples, while much that is distinctly new and original is also offered.

The use of paper and draperies which match, or at least are designed for use together, is a noticeable feature of present day modes in wall treatment. Panelling is another of the distinct characteristics of fashionable wall decoration, very narrow borders being used to outline these panels.

Where a scheme of period decoration is attempted, the wall papers and draperies are all important factors in carrying it to completion.

When a number of pictures are to be hung in a room, a plain and unobtrusive wall paper should be selected and fancy effects in applying it tabooed. Pictures hung upon a panelled wall must be very carefully arranged, with due regard to the panelling.

Plain or striped papers are sometimes carried to the ceiling, with a tiny border at the top, and another two or three feet below marking the top of the panels. These borders are usually of the wreath or garland design, cut out along the lower edge, with the background of plain cream or the tone of the side wall paper along the upper edge.

Absolutely plain walls, with drop ceilings, in lighter shades are always in unassailable good taste, and a safe choice in a small room or one well filled with furniture, bric-a-brac or pictures.

These are just a few hints as to methods you can use in the rooms you wish to have done this autumn.

Now just note—the papers for any idea above can be supplied right here—or at the most ten days notice will be enough to secure the more elaborate ideas.

Talk it over with the head of the department—is boiling over with good decorative plans.

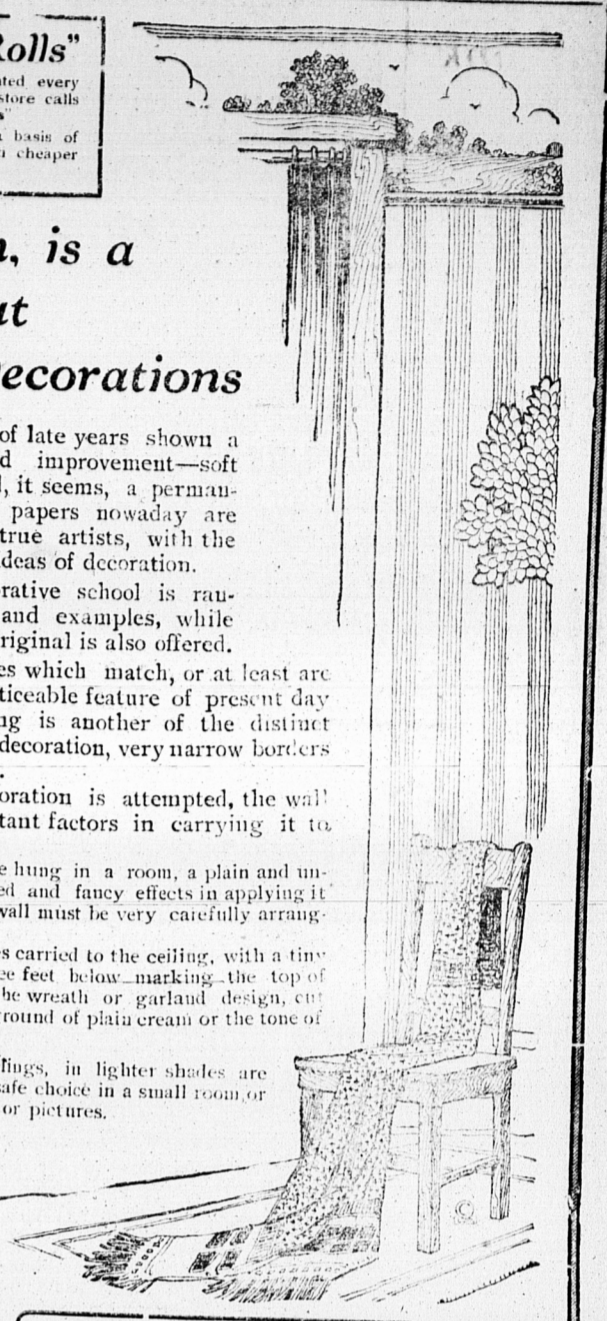

WELSH DROWNED IN IRON MINE CAUSE OF DECREASE IN CANAL TRAFFIC. HIBERNIA, N. J., Oct. 20.—Twelve were drowned here today when a blast destroyed a partition between two shafts in the iron mines of the Wharton Steel company and a great quantity of water accumulated in an old shaft flooded the gallery where they were at work. All the victims were foreigners except David Straight, foreman of the gang, who lost his life in trying to aid his men. The accident occurred in what is known as the New Langdon shaft, where six men were at work. Between this shaft and the old one, which has been abandoned, was a partition of logs. A blast fired soon after the day shift went to work this morning weakened this barrier so that it gave way before the subterranean lake that had accumulated in the adjoining gallery.
