was not known immediately if this was the fatal wound. Headquarters was notified of the shooting by Sgt. Art Pyke, an army signaller home on furlough, who lives above the Brody apartment. He said he heard several shots and later sounds of persons running along the street.

He entered the Brody kitchen, he said, in time to see Mrs. Brody fall from a chair to the floor with her face and clothing covered with blood. The Brody home is located at the rear of a ladies' wear store the couple operated, and a trail of blood led from the apartment into the store for about 30 feet. The woman apparently had tried to reach the street for help after being shot and then returned to the kitchen.

Her husband was found lying on his back across the threshold between dining room and kitchen. His face and clothing were covered with blood. Police found a powder burn on his shirt just above the heart, indicating at least one of the bullets had been fired at close range. Two tables in the kitchen were smeared with blood, as were the kitchen sink and raucets.

The couple is survived by four sons: Dr. Saul Brody, Dr. McEwen, Dr. Joseph Brody and Ralph all in New York, and three daughters: Mrs. Isaac Hoffman, Montreal; Esther, a New York school teacher, and Mollie, in Glace Bay.

MRS. WILLIAM YOULD KENTVILLE, June 15 - The happy union of one of Canada's oldest married couples, ex-Mayor William Yould and Mrs. Yould, who last October celebrated their 73rd wedding anniversary, was vividly recalled in the service at the Blanchard Fraser Memorial hospital late Saturday night of Mrs. Yould. A broken hip suffered when she slipped and fell in her home several days after she celebrated her 91st birthday on Victoria Day, was followed by complications which caused her death. The news of the passing of Mrs. Yould, for many years known as Kentville's First Lady, was received with universal regret on all sides. During the winter she was seriously ill for three months but her remarkable courage and will to live brought about her recovery. Just prior to her accident, Mrs. Yould had been able to take her daily walks with Mr. Yould as had been customary for many years and she was the picture of health. On their various wedding anniversaries in later years, the veteran ex-mayor and his wife received congratulations from many notables including several from the late King George V and the present King George VI. Prime Ministers of Canada, Premiers of Nova Scotia, Cabinet Ministers and Members of Parliament from this province were also among the number who sent messages of good will during an interview on her last birthday she was confident of a British victory in the war. "There will always be an England of that I am sure," she said. Married Confederation Year Daughter of an English sea captain and an Irish mother, the late Captain and Mrs. Arthur Lovett, she was born at Dartmouth, May 24, 1860. Her marriage to Mr. Yould took place at St. Paul's Church, Halifax, October 29, 1887, the year of Confederation. Mr. Yould who will celebrate his 94th birthday next month, was at that time employed with the old Nova Scotia Railway. The couple moved to Kentville some seventy years ago. Surviving besides her husband are four children, Mrs. A. W. Hyndman, Charlottetown; Mrs. George Wilson, Windsor; Mrs. George H. Turner, Fort Saskatchewan, Alberta; and Miss Adelaide Yould at home. Grandchildren include: William Wilson, Berwick druggist; Miss Dorothy Wilson, R.N. on the staff of the Nova Scotia Sanatorium; William Hyndman, Assistant Manager of the main branch of the Royal Bank of Canada, Halifax; Dr. Charles Hyndman, Charlottetown and Montreal; Mrs. Constance MacCarthy, Washington, D.C. and two granddaughters in Westport, Canada, William Wilson, Jr., Berwick, is a great grandson.
