Mrs. Manion Makes First Public Address (By Canadian Press Staff Writer) SHERBROOKE, Que., March 6.—(CP)—Mrs. R. Manion, French-Canadian wife of the National Conservative leader, stepped to the podium last night in the election battle tonight with a quarter-hour broadcast of her own over a Quebec radio network.

The broadcast was not only Mrs. Manion's first active participation in the present campaign, although she had been accompanying her husband throughout his tour—but was her first public address.

"I will not presume to tell anyone in the province of Quebec—or elsewhere—how he or she should vote. But I think I may safely say that I know something of my husband's mind, having lived with him for more than 30 years, and naturally knowing intimately his whole career."

Canadian Navy Went Into Active Service When War Began By Frank Flaherty Canadian Press Staff Writer

OTTAWA, March 6.—(CP)—O Canada's three arm services the navy was the only one to go on active service with its whole establishment immediately on the outbreak of war and it has remained on active service every day of Canada's first six months of war.
