MONDAY
ATTENDED FUNERAL - Mr. E. F. Foley, M. L. A., Mr. A. E. McLean, M. P., and Mr. Henry Wedge, Grand Knight of the Summerside Council of the K. of C. attended the funeral on Friday morning of the late Frank Callaghan, which was held from Palmer Road Church that morning.

Chief Justice N. W. Rowell of Ontario, chairman of a Royal Commission on Federal-Provincial relations arrived in Charlottetown Saturday night. The visit here at this time, Hon. Mr. Rowell said, was solely for the purpose of conferring with the Premier and members of the Prince Edward Island government regarding the work of the commission and to reach an agreement on a date for the sitting of the commission here. Sitings were scheduled to open at Winnipeg on November 29th, the commission chairman said, and would then go to Regina. Special sessions would be held in Ottawa in January and the Maritime hearings were expected to begin early in February.

The death occurred quite suddenly shortly after seven o'clock on Sunday morning at the home of her daughter, Mrs. W. J. Lidstone, of Mrs. Mary A. Campbell in her 90th year. Mrs. Campbell was the widow of the late Donald Campbell of Cape Traverse. For many years Mrs. Campbell had resided with her daughter at Summerside and was loved and honored for her beautiful Christian character. Mrs. Campbell was quite active for her years and had been up and about the night previous to her death. Early in the morning she took a sudden heart attack and shortly after the arrival of the doctor breathed her last. There are left to mourn besides Mrs. Lidstone, a son, Rev. Dr. Campbell of Nashville, Tenn. The funeral is being held on Tuesday at 10 a. m. from the residence of Mr. and Mrs. Winslow J. Lidstone leaving after a short service to the Church of Scotland at Cape Traverse.

Friends will regret to learn of the passing of Mrs. John Sharp whose death occurred at her home on Spring Street, Summerside early Sunday morning after a short illness.

Mrs. Sharp had lived for many years in Summerside where she was well known and most highly esteemed. A staunch member of the Presbyterian Church, Mrs. Sharp had always associated herself with the work of the Church and will be much missed. Mrs. Sharp also kept herself well informed on world affairs and was a good conversationalist. Much sympathy is extended to her daughter, Miss Zilpha Sharp who resided with her and her remaining sons and daughters, Mrs. James MacKinnon, and Dr. Claude Sharp of Edmonton. Mrs. Dr. Frank MacNeill of Winnipeg and Dr. Richard Sharp of Summerside. The funeral is taking place on Tuesday afternoon at 2 o'clock from her late residence.

His Honour Lieutenant Governor DeBlois has agreed to head a provincial committee of laymen and physicians to link up with a proposed Canada-wide organization for the better control of cancer, and has assured Dr. J. S. McEachern, chairman of the Cancer Committee of the Canadian Medical Association, that this Province will cooperate in every way in the movement. Dr. McEachern, who visited Charlottetown last week, conferred with His Honour and with representatives of the Prince Edward Island Medical Association

on problems connected with organization for cancer control. He left at noon Saturday for Montreal and Toronto. In the latter city he will report to the Central Provisions Executive the results of his conference with medical men at different centres in the Maritime Provinces.

The death of Mrs. Annie Gordon, beloved wife of the late Mr. James Gordon of Appin Road, occurred on October 6, 1937, after an illness of some three years. Within the last four months Mrs. Gordon suffered several paralytic strokes and at the last she gently fell asleep.

Mrs. Gordon was born at Bonshaw in 1857, the daughter of the late Peter MacDonald. Thousands of dollars damage was caused in the eastern section of the Province early last week by a "terrific gale," according to reports.

The highest tide seen in that section of the province for many years accompanied the storm which carried away the Government breakwater on Boughton beach in many places and threw it along the shore. The beach itself was a most cut through in one place. The beach, which forms a breakwater in Boughton Bay, would be destroyed unless repair work was begun soon, it was said. A boat owned by MacDonald brothers and dories owned by De Gros Marsh fishermen were demolished. One fisherman found only his anchor and cable left after the storm. Part of the breakwater at Graham's Creek, Murray Harbor North was destroyed and a boat smashed. The heavy seas smashed onto the verandah of a house owned by a Lauchlin fisherman, a considerable distance from the shore.

Mill, Edmonton, Alta.; and Inez Mrs. Frank Lafferty, with whom she made her home. Two sisters also survive, Mrs. Peter Oliver and Mrs. C. B. Murrely of this city. The funeral will take place today Monday at two o'clock from her late residence 256 Euston Street to the Peoples Cemetery.
