ALLIES NOT PLEASED WITH SECOND OFFER BY U. S. FOR PEACE

Feeling that Wilson Administration Has Submitted to German Pressure.

WASHINGTON, September 18.—It is learned from an authoritative source that the second mediation offer from the State Department produced a very unpleasant feeling at the chancelleries of the Allies, amounting in some instances to distinct irritation. The offer, in fact, was displeasing.

As explained to the Eagle correspondent by a well-informed diplomat, there is a feeling among the Allies that the Wilson Administration has submitted to strong pressure from German sources, and is being used in a manner that is far from pleasing to the foes of the Kaiser. No objection was felt to the first offer of the United States to use its good offices in the interests of peace, but the renewal of the proposal was regarded as uncalled for, and has stirred a feeling of resentment.

"I do not hesitate to say," said The Eagle informant, "that if the United States continues its efforts to force peace before being invited to do so, the policy will seriously injure this country in its relations with the dominant powers of the world. I do not believe that further offers of mediation from the United States will be regarded as the act of a friendly nation."

"The pact of the Allies not to make peace separately, was brought about as a result of the pressure of the Wilson Administration to stop the war. It was feared that France, in the first sufferings of reverses, might announce that while she had not been beaten, she was willing to accept the pressing demands that she sue for peace. Now the Allies have made up their minds that there shall be no peace until they have won a crushing victory."

"The intention of the Allies is so to cripple Germany that there will be no danger of a repetition of this war for at least a generation or more. Further offers of mediation from the United States will gain for us the ill will not only of England, France and Russia, but also of Japan."

"Russia is already resentful of the manner in which Roosevelt stopped the Russia-Japanese war. It is important that the United States should not offend England to an extent that the latter would not be disposed to protect our interests in the Far East with respect to Japan in the final settlements after the war."

"Germany is having difficulty in obtaining funds to prosecute the war. German bankers have been offered great inducements to supply money, and although the war chest has not been exhausted, it will soon be necessary to raise additional revenue. New Yorkers are well informed of this phase of the situation."

CANADA WILL GET MANY ORDERS FOR WAR SUPPLIES

OTTAWA, Sept. 19.—Canadian manufacturers will share largely in contracts to be given overseas by the British government, and possibly by some of her allies for food supplies, equipment and various articles of war. These in addition to the demand already created by the outfitting of a Canadian expeditionary force will do much to improve the industrial situation along many lines. At the trade and commerce department it was pointed out today that statements were appearing lately in the papers that large orders for various supplies of food and munitions of war were being given out by Great Britain and France to the United States. The department has received advice to the effect that these are untrue and that in respect to supplies of a kind obtainable in Canada and which are not obtainable in adequate quantities in the United Kingdom due regard will be paid to Canada in that respect. She will share the trade with the other overseas dominions.

Sir George Foster, Minister of Trade and Commerce in 1913, today stated that the outlook for Canadian manufacture was comparatively good. He emphasized that the most immediate opportunity of the present war was in the supply of Canadian manufacturers of articles formerly imported from Germany, Austria and other European countries. The great problem according to Sir George was to bring the large importer of such commodities and the Canadian manufacturer producing or in a position to produce them together. The department will bend every effort in this direction.

Among other things which are being done is the inventorizing of the stock of a modern drug store, to show that at present some seventy per cent. of its stock comes from Germany, Austria and other European countries.

LOAD KITCENER WENT TO VISIT THE WOUNDED

War Secretary Exchanges Reminiscences With Stricken Soldiers in Hospital.

HIS BULLET WOUND.

Carried it for Three Years and Got Well; "Hurry Up!" His Advice.

"Lord Kitcener!" This announcement, made at the door of one of the military wards in London Hospital on a Saturday afternoon, had the effect of a bugle-blast. Every man who could contrive to stand, stood at attention; those who could not raised their hands to the salute. A ringing cheer filled the ward; wounded men put the last ounce of their strength into this welcome to the great man of the British Army.

Blunt, kindly, encouraging, he saw everything and talked to every soldier who caught his eye. And at the slightest hint he knew where each man had been and what his regiment had done.

"Where were you?" "Don't know rightly, sir; but it was on Wednesday."
"Yes; you got it hot. And you gave it hot to them. Well, we've got to give 'em hot again! Carry on!"

Rapid-Fire Inquiries.

"And you?" inquired the Field-Marshal, with a quick turn to another, but with a kindly, understanding look in his eyes.
"With the —, at —," replied the wounded warrior proudly.



Good work you did too. Well, we're going to see this thing through, aren't we?"
Sick men though they were, the answer the soldiers gave was inspiring in its warmth.
"Well hurry up and get well," said Lord Kitcener. "We want you all back to the front as soon as you are fit." Again the wavering, thrilling cheer; modest but determined answers, such as "Want nothing better sir."
A grand military figure was that of Lord Kitcener despite the civilian clothes, as he made his swift progress through the wards.
"Hurry up and get well. They have been coming on, but we're going to stop 'em. Aren't we?"
"Yes, sir." "Yes, sir." "Just what we want sir!"
"Right! Get well as fast as you can."

They bore the marks of honorable wounds—arms in slings, bandaged heads, some limping, some in hospital chairs.
They walked back to the hospital, single file, through a great and silent crowd of people of the East End. Two policemen were enough to keep the path. Not a cheer was heard. The impressive silence of the people had a profounder significance than that of any sounding demonstration.
