**—TWO INJURED IN CRASH—**Marne Kennedy and Major MacGregor last night were recovering from numerous cuts and bruises following a narrow escape from death when their automobile, proceeding about 35 miles per hour, skidded into a wheel trench and crashed into a bridge culvert throwing them through the windshield. Major MacGregor landed in a wire fence 20 feet from the bridge. The car, after passing over the concrete coping which toppled over on him. Meanwhile, Mr. Kennedy who landed in the road in a dazed condition and with the assistance of two small girls, lifted the machine off MacGregor who was almost strangled. MacGregor was taken to Mrs. Turner's nursing home in O'Leary, not far from the scene of the accident, by Willard Betts where he was treated for a deep cut in the neck and another on the side of the face as well as superficial cuts and bruises. Kennedy was taken to the home of John MacPherson who was passing by where Mrs. MacPherson, a nurse, rendered first aid. He suffered a bad gash near the right temple, had his teeth loosened and several lacerations about the face. Both men were later treated by Dr. B. W. Tanton. The men were proceeding home from West Point, P. E. I., when the accident occurred. The car was almost totally demolished.

**EXTRA PALE SILVER YEARLING MALES.** Brent Howatt had the nod for this class with a really very fine animal, clear as crystal and faultlessly finished. Roy Woodside was second, Gordon MacMillan third and Roy Woodside fourth.  
**EXTRA PALE SILVER ADULT FEMALES** were scarce as hens' teeth, in fact so scarce that the only one to face the starter—judge—was the former horseman but now a noted fox rancher, W. B. McArthur. Brad was all prepared for competition, however, and was ready to take on all comers with his entry.

**EXTRA PALE SILVER YEARLING FEMALES.** This was a good class although the entries were not very numerous the quality was high. S. R. Johnstone of Fortune, whose stock has clicked so well this year, was the winner with a real high type specimen. Stewart & Lewis, Woodside S. B. Fox Company and Kildare Cape Fox Company followed in order with beautiful clear pups.

**EXTRA PALE SILVER MALE PUPS.** Stewart & Lewis were first and second, Hillard Muttart third, M. W. Wood fourth, with a very desirable quartet.  
**EXTRA PALE SILVER FEMALE PUPS** was the last of the thirty-six classes to appear on the table. Again Stewart & Lewis were first with Johnstone Bros., New London, second, S. R. Johnstone, Fortune, third, H. G. Muttart fourth.

Competition for herds was a keen one and it was fascinating to see them laid out on the tables, all clear colored, beautiful specimens, the selects of the select. Hillard Muttart had the honor of winning the first event—Senior Herd, consisting of one adult male and three females all two years old or over. Stewart & Lewis won the Yearling Herd class, also the Junior Herd class, while Roy Woodside won the class for Sire and Three of his Get. Hillard Muttart won the class for Dam and Two of Her Progeny, and W. B. McArthur the prize for best Matched Pair, Male and Female Adults shown in class, Stewart & Lewis winning the prize for best matched pair, male and female pups shown in class.

This morning probably the most interesting feature of the entire fox show will be the awarding of championships. This will bring together the best adult males in classes 1 to 6, the best year-old males in classes 1 to 6, the best adult females in classes 1 to 6, the best year-old females shown in classes 1 to 6, the best male pups in classes 1 to 6, and the best female pups in classes 1 to 6.

Then the champion male pup of the series will compete with the champion female for the pup championship of the show, the champion males in the various classes will come together to select the champion male in the show, and the champions of the female classes as above will be brought together to select the champion female of the show. The final event will be the competition between the champion male of the show and the champion female of the show for Grand Champion fox in show. Last but not least will be the presentation of trophies to the owners of champions. It is expected that Premier, the Honorable Thane A. Campbell, M.A., will officiate and it is likely that the presentation will be made between twelve and one o'clock or perhaps earlier.
