SPRINGFIELD.—One of the most successful temperance meetings held for some time, took place Wednesday night at Springfield. This settlement, has for years been noted for its peace loving and sober people. The temperance sentiment in this community is quite strong as evidenced by the nice hall which has been built by the local division of the Sons of Temperance. This building reflects great credit upon the enterprise and steadfastness of the temperance workers. At 8 o'clock the meeting was called to order by Mr. F. N. McKay, Chairman. The first item of the program was a chorus by the choir, which was nicely rendered. The singing by several of the local friends was of a high order. Rev. L. Haslam of Liverpool, N. S., but who is a Springfield boy and who possesses a fine rich bass voice, sang a solo which was one of the features of the evening. The first speaker on the program was Rev. W. D. Wilson, Field Secretary of the Temperance Alliance. The Chairman, in a neat speech introduced the rev. gentleman who then came to the platform. Mr. Wilson said how pleased he was to have heard such a program as prefaced his address by stating that this community had reason to be proud of its record as a valiant supporter of the Temperance cause. His subject was the Wrong of Temperance. The speaker pictured a scene in a Cape Breton town, of a boy being crushed and bruised to death by an electric car. He told of the grief-stricken and broken-hearted parents of the awful darkness that came into their lives because of the loss of their only boy. Do you know, said the speaker, that on Prince Edward Island there are scores of boys who are being crushed and broken and bruised beneath the juggernaut of intemperance. Many a parent to-night is grief-stricken because their boy is being broken on the wheel and there seems to be no help for them. If then went on to emphasize the need of a strong co-operative movement to drive this fiend from our midst. Rev. L. Haslam was called and when he responded he said how glad he was that he had come, and to once more look into their faces and urge them to be on the right side, to stand for truth, to do right, to fill up their life with God was his message. After Mr. Haslam's address several of the men of the community made short speeches and proposed a vote of thanks to Rev. Mr. Wilson. This was carried unanimously and Mr. Wilson replied, thanking them for their kindness. The singing of the National Anthem brought a delightful meeting to a close, all declaring that they must meet soon again.

The dredging work to accomplish this purpose is now being commenced. This side of the wharf was dredged a few years ago, but it is found desirable to deepen it still further.

IMMIGRANT FARMERS.—With regard to the scheme of introducing immigrant farmers from the Old country to this Island that Capt. G. E. Thomas and Mr. G. A. Richardson are carrying out, the former has just written an interesting letter to Mr. J. E. B. McCreedy, the Publicity Agent, regarding the progress of the project. He states: "I may say that things have not come up to our expectations, but we shall bring out a party in September of 22 to 27 people. Five of them will take up farms. The remainder are farm hands and gardeners, and one is a butcher who intends going into the business in the Island and hog-raising. We are in touch with, and have interviewed, 32 other farmers in different parts of Great Britain. Most of these, I think, will come out in the spring, but some are required to give a year's notice to their landlords; and failing to do this, under the Lands Acts have to forfeit certain quantities of their crops and other penalties that the free and independent farmers of P. E. Island know nothing whatever of. Others have to give a month's notice. These are practically the reasons why we have not been as successful as we anticipated, but we have confidence of bringing out a strong party in May."
