Automobiles in India.

Automobilism is making steady progress in India, and patrons have not been found wanting who are ready to lend valuable aid in furthering the industry and pastime there. His Highness the Maharajah of Kapurthala has, says The Car, an electrically driven vehicle, which was built by Krieger of Paris, and is the only one of its kind in India. Its silent and graceful running always excites enthusiasm wherever it goes. The Maharajah of Kapurthala, by the way, has quite a number of motor vehicles, and it is possible that one of these may compete in the forthcoming reliability trials between Delhi and Bombay, for which he contemplates giving a cup. The Gaikwar of Baroda, who is, perhaps, better known in England than any other eastern potentate, has also offered a handsome trophy for the reliability trials. It is hoped that the stimulus thus offered to the development of automobilism in India will have its due effect, and that amateur owners—to whom only is the trial open—will be induced to visit India with their cars. The road from Delhi to Bombay is a magnificent highway, as good as the Great North road, while perfect weather is invariably assured to the traveler between the months of October and March.

LADY PREACHER.

Novel Experiment in the Pulpit Carried Out at Leicester.

The first woman to become a fully qualified minister of an English church held her first services at Leicester on the 23rd September with a success which may lead other congregations to follow this interesting example.

Miss Gerud von Petzold, who has undertaken the duties of the ministry of the Unitarian Free Christian Church at Narborough road, Leicester, officiated at the morning and evening services, as the appointed preacher. She had previously given three trial sermons, and the congregation were unanimous in inviting her to take the place of the Rev. W. Whitaker, who recently resigned.

Pale but composed, the young lady faced the large congregations, and conducted the services in an earnest, impressive and graceful manner. She possesses a pleasing and well modulated voice. The sermons were read, but the delivery was good.

Leaving with clasped hands on the desk on which her manuscript was placed, she kept her eyes mainly fixed on the congregation. She has a German accent, not strongly marked, and the quaint articulation of some of the words was rather attractive than otherwise.

Her language was simple enough to be understood even by the children. At the morning service she preached from the text: "But if thou shalt seek the Lord thy God thou shalt find him, if thou search after him with all thy heart and thy soul."

"Look at the world around you," she said. "Look at the men and women selling their souls for pleasure, for money, ever ready to take advantage of one another, to make the best of a worldly bargain, in their spare moments giving themselves up to their passions, degrading themselves body and soul."

The lessons of the Bible learned in childhood should, she urged, be carried into the lives of men and women.

Her addresses were followed with close attention, and leading members of the congregation afterwards expressed approval of the manner in which the services had been conducted.

Miss Petzold was born twenty-eight years ago in West Prussia, and has been in England about six years. She soon obtained a complete mastery of the language, and graduated M.A. at Edinburgh University in 1900.

Afterwards she underwent a three years' course of ministerial studies at Manchester College, Oxford, which is connected with the Unitarian body.
