CRIPPEN EXAMINED

(Continued from page 1)

"Take my word for it, Crippen was living unhappily with his wife. He is not a man of fiery temper. He is a thinker and plotter. Weeks before actual force was used he wrangled and bickered. The night came when he struck her. He struck her harder than he imagined, and she died. He was afraid.

"I am just as sure as I am standing on this little plank walk that Crippen is a coward. He did not mean to kill her, although he plotted to rid himself of her. When he found she was dead, he cunningly planned to cover his tracks. I have known many a case of the same nature. He quarrelled, went too far, and in a moment realized the consequences. How to evade the law became the paramount question. He would hide her.

"Headquarters have received information from some source, as yet unfathomed, that either friends of Crippen, or fanatics, tried to warn the doctor of his danger. This is one reason why the wireless service was so severely censored. Two characters, unknown alike to the police and newspapermen and summer colony, had been hearing about the wireless station at Father Point and making anxious enquiry as to the possibility of communicating with the Montrose. The authorities here were not in the least alarmed over the possibility of Crippen's escape, but they feared that he might learn of what was waiting for him and blow his brains out.

ST. JOHN, Aug. 2—The Telegraph's London correspondent writes: An elderly common place man, a little over five feet three inches in height, with a bald head, false teeth, prominent eyes peering mildly at the world through spectacles and a manner remarkable for its unobtrusiveness and reticence—such is Dr. Crippen, the interesting American who is "wanted" by the London police for the trifling exploit of murdering his wife under unusually cold-blooded circumstances.

No wonder the crime should have caused an overwhelming sensation in London. The psychological surprise of the same personality of the murderer contrasted with the deliberate cold-blooded horror of his deed might well startle a community whose ideas as to the manner and appearance of double-dyed villains were, perhaps, a bit stereotyped.

History and fiction alike have given us a great variety of the types of the human monster. Many of them were obviously low and repulsive, others impressively sinister and suave, while some swaggered and were quasi-romantic. Nearly all were physically imposing. But this tiny little man who looks as if his chief interest might be his own rheumatic symptoms and the quality of the gruel he might take each night for a cold—this the man to murder his wife, bury her mutilated body in a cellar, writing lying letters to account for her disappearance, and then after living some months in the house in which her body was concealed busying himself with the task of carefully covering up his tracks, to finally abscond with \$5,000 worth of jewelry in company with the good-looking girl who had been his typist—this indeed is a new pattern of villain. No writer of detective stories or of "penny dreadfuls" ever planned a more startling solution of crime by fixing the guilt upon a more (apparently) unlikely person.

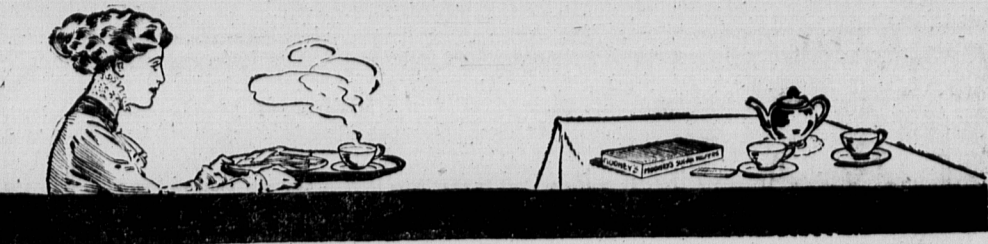

BICENTENARY OF THE CHURCH OF ENGLAND IN CANADA

HALIFAX, Aug. 2—Two hundred years ago the first regular services in Canada according to the use of the Church of England were held at Annapolis Royal, Nova Scotia, where after the capture of the fort by General Nicholson, a service of thanksgiving for the success of Her Majesty's (Queen Anne's) Arms was held by Rev. John Harrison, and a sermon preached by Rev. Samuel Hosker. Today the Church of England in Canada has twenty-two dioceses stretching from the Atlantic to the Pacific, and the Bicentenary of its work in this Dominion is to be celebrated by special events at Halifax, Windsor and Annapolis Royal, the first week of September next. At Halifax, All Saints Cathedral, today the finest Church edifice in Canada, erected at a cost of some \$150,000, is to be opened on September 3rd, as a memorial in stone of the Bicentenary, and the three following days a great Canadian Church Congress is to be held, at which there promises to be a record attendance.

The distinguished Canadian ecclesiastics who will take part include the Archbishop of Rupertland and Ottawa, and the Bishops of Nova Scotia, Fredericton, Quebec, Montreal, Toronto, Ontario, Huron, Niagara, Algoma, Calgary, Moosesee, New Westminster, and Columbia, while as for Deans, Archdeacons and Canons, they will be there by the score and laymen.
