PRINCE ALBERT NATIONAL PARK IS DEDICATED

Premier King Opens 1,377 Square Mile Area in Saskatchewan.

PRINCE ALBERT NATIONAL PARK, Aug. 13.—Premier MacKenzie King opened another of Canada's park playgrounds here Friday. Standing on the shore of Lake Waskesiu, where thousands of people had gathered in the summer sunshine, the Prime Minister dedicated the 1,377 square miles of forest, lake and river, which is Prince Albert National Park...

SHOULD APPRECIATE BEAUTY "In the building of Canadian national life and the moulding of our national character, it is of the utmost importance that we should cultivate an appreciation of all that is beautiful in our physical environment," said Premier King, in a speech opening the park...

Under Mr. King's regime, 591,000 people have left us for the United States—our sons and daughters. And to replace them we have only 573,000 entering Canada in the same period—many of assorted nationalities from the continent of Europe...

There is an remedy. It is to give Canada an equal opportunity in competition against the world. We want for Canada what the United States farmer is getting for his potatoes and his wheat, and the United States fishermen and manufacturers for their products...

REGULAR MONTHLY MEETING OF THE CITY COUNCIL

The regular monthly meeting of the City Council was held last night in the Council Chambers, with His Worship the Mayor, City Health Officer and acting Recorder K. M. Martin in their respective chairs. All the Councillors were present with the exception of Councillor Kenney.

Mr. James McMillan, acting as City Clerk in the absence of Mr. George Nicholson. The minutes of the previous monthly meeting and a special meeting were adopted as read. A petition signed by fifty business men with regard to opening the Market Square during Exhibition Week was presented...

The following grants were made for the year 1928: St. Vincent's Orphanage—\$250.00; P. E. Island Hospital—\$1,000.00; Charlottetown Hospital—\$1,000.00.

Councillor Foster, Chairman of the Streets Committee, in his report said that asphalt paving had begun on Prince Street Thursday morning, and that all this kind of work will have been completed by September 1st. He added that further graveling will be discontinued until the permanent street work is finished...

There were also 6 convictions for non-payment of City Dog Tax, 1 for owning a vicious dog, and 2 under the Sanitary By-Law. Four charges of Disorderly conduct were dismissed.

During July we assisted the Prohibition Officers in 9 searches of premises suspected of the unlawful sale or possession of liquor. 9 prosecutions were entered, resulting in six convictions and 3 dismissals. Five offenders were committed to the County Jail.

Other duties performed by the Police are as follows: Prisoners escorted to County Jail 23; Patient escorted to Falconwood 1; Children escorted to Orphanage 3; Summonses served 124; Subpoenas served 12; Ticket of leave reported 1; Houses quarantined 1; Stray horses impounded 1.

FINES IMPOSED AND COLLECTED during the month: \$958.00. One fine imposed under the Prohibition Act \$205.00. One fine imposed under the Customs-Excise Act \$80.00. Outstanding fines collected \$36.00. Total amount collected—\$1279.00.

FORMALLY ACCEPTS NOMINATION

Herbert Hoover Repeats Stand for Efficient Enforcement of all Laws and Proposes Tariff Increases to give the Farmer Adequate Protection.

STANFORD UNIVERSITY, STADIUM, Calif. Aug. 13.—Herbert Hoover accepted the Republican presidential nomination Saturday with a reiteration of his stand against repeal of the prohibition amendment or any modification of enforcement that would constitute nullification and with the exposition of a three-fold agricultural relief program.

For relief to the farmer, he outlined a program embracing tariff protection and increased and cheaper transportation in building up farmer-owned and controlled corporations to take care of crop surpluses.

In addition he declared vigorously for religious tolerance; inveighed against corruption in public office; struck a note of idealism in the relation of government to the people, and issued a call to the women and the youth of the country to contribute their enthusiasm to the success of the American experiment in democracy.

Declaring that agriculture presented "the most urgent economic problem in our nation today," Hoover said the Republican party farm plank constituted "a definite plan of relief" needing only "the detailed elaboration of legislation and appropriations to put it into force."

Turning to corruption which he said had been participated in "by individual officials and members of both political parties in national, state and municipal affairs," Hoover declared dishonesty on government to be a double wrong.

Light, the editor of report on "The Origin and Quality of Commercial Live Stock Marketed in Canada", issued by the department of Agriculture at Ottawa, was the heavy increase in percentage of hogs shipped direct to packing plants. An important feature in helping the price of hogs during the year was the heavy movement of stock for export, the total showing more than 86,000 head as against 46,000 during the previous year.
