Annual Meeting of Zion Church

The annual congregational meeting of Zion Presbyterian Church was held in the Church hall Thursday night.

Mr. S. Angus McDonald presided and there was a large attendance. The reports of the various departments of the church were submitted.

The Trustees' Report showed that the Church is in a very flourishing condition, with all outstanding accounts paid, except the Building Fund. This report showed the receipts to be \$4,707.

The collections for the Missionary Association were the largest in the history of the congregation. The Building Fund showed a balance on hand of \$3,127, and there is still to be paid in connection with the new Church \$10,000.

At present there is \$1,000 ready to be paid on this account, which will reduce the balance to \$9,000.

The estimates for the coming year, totaling \$5,175. This is an increase over the previous year, owing to the high cost of coal, and other incidental expenses, which must be provided for.

All the organizations in the Church submitted reports, showing the different societies to be in excellent working condition. A committee comprising, Messrs. W. T. Huggins, S. Angus McDonald and Geo. W. McLeod, was appointed to forward a resolution of thanks to Rev. George C. Taylor, the Pastor of this Church, now on active service, as chaplain at the front, for his continued interest in the Church and for his contribution of \$125.00 sent to the funds of the Church for the past year.

What the Boys Think of P.E.I.

Extract from a letter received by a friend in Charlottetown from an Officer serving with a P. E. I. unit overseas.

"The election is over, but I may say we Islanders hung our heads in shame for the way things went at home. If the Islanders had their way the brave Artillery lads and the old 165th would have been deserted; but thank God there was enough red blood in the other Provinces to carry conscription.

"Some of the 'rotters' at home would rather see Sir Robert Borden defeated than the Kaiser. 'The soldiers vote may change some of it and remove the dirty stain from the Island's shield. It is too bad a Hun submarine could not give some of those Pro Germans you have down there a taste of what we shall get shortly.

"It will sure sound like blasphemy for the majority down there to sing 'God Save the King.' 'To see the thousands of wounded lads in this lovely old England and to think that my home, the once called 'Gem of the Gulf' would by their vote compel these lads to return to the firing line instead of sending fresh men over to take their place. 'For once in my life I am ashamed to acknowledge I come from the Island.'
