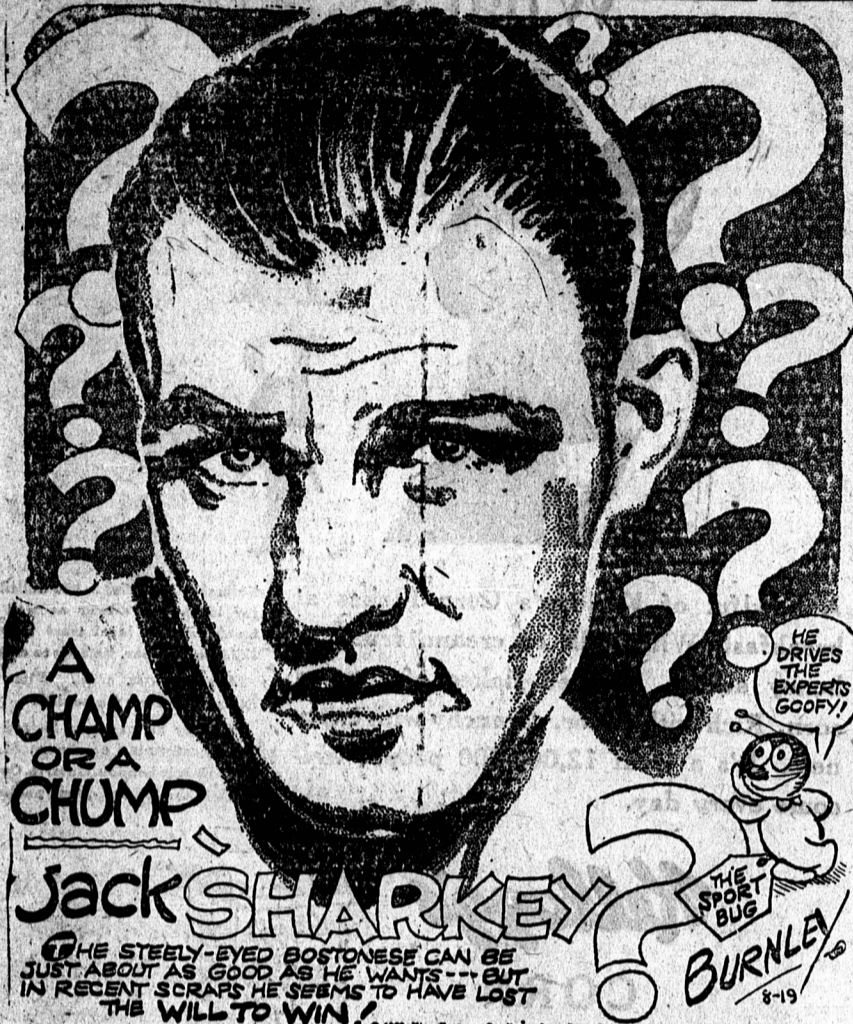

Introduces New Western Star SERIAL, COMEDY AND SPECIAL MUSIC ADDED ATTRACTIONS

'Shootin' Irons,' the Paramount picture that opened at the Capitol Theatre yesterday is a gripping, high-speed action story that clicks from the start.

It introduces a new Western star, Jack Luden, who is a decided improvement over any Western star already established, in this reviewer's humble opinion.

Yet has youth and personality; he looks athletic enough to do his own riding, and he can act. Luden is bound to go to the top of the heap in a hurry.

'Shootin' Irons' is crammed with thrills. They start without delay when in the opening sequence Luden saves Sally Blane, the girl; and her father, Richard Carlyle, from death beneath a wild horse stampede.

The girl's father is a fugitive from the law. To save him from arrest and the girl from disgrace, Luden holds up a stage bearing the accusing papers and is himself brandish as a crook, when his foreman, Fred Kohler, betrays him.

The bare-knuckle fight between Luden and Kohler, who is a rival for the heart of the girl, is as realistic as anything ever put on the screen. Luden makes a splendid fighter and he has no mean adversary in Kohler.

When Luden takes the girl and her father and commences his flight toward the border, pursued by a posse of his town-folk, the action becomes the kind that makes you hold on to your seat, close your eyes if you are nervous, and perhaps even stream. The running fight over the tortuous mountain trails and on the brink of a yawning canyon is guaranteed to make one's hair stand on end.

The love interest is not subordinated in the story, however, but is carried through cleverly, as is the comedy, ably handled by Loyal Underwood and Scott McGee.

All members of the cast, which includes Guy Oliver and Arthur Millett, acquit themselves well. Richard Rossen directed the picture.
