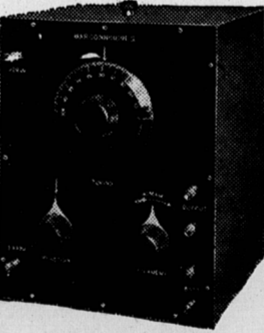
—Mr. J. N. Morris, manager of the Provincial Bank of Canada, Summerside, has returned from a holiday trip to the mainland.

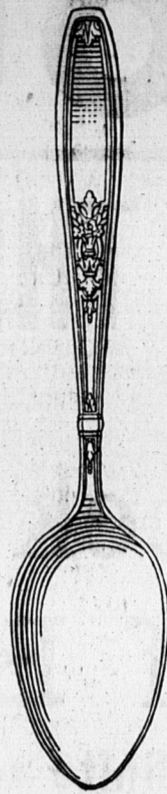
