The Commissioner said this was the complaint he had heard that this ice was not hushed. Mr. Kickham asked the Commissioner of Public Works if it is the intention of the Government to open a new road or repair the old road on the North side of Bay Fortune. The Commissioner said the Department was in negotiation as to the purchase of the site of way. A party backed down from the price and the matter was now in abeyance. Hon. Mr. Cumiskey submitted the plans and specifications of Murrell Frigate. The Government was not supposed to give the estimate before a contract had been entered into. Eleven tenders have been received but as no contract is yet signed they could not be disclosed. He also submitted statement of the bearings etc. One reason that the contract was not signed was because some newspapers had stated that the site was not available. He was told another opinion on the site. He read the report of H. J. McKeessie who said that after consultation with other engineers including the Chief of the L. C. R. he had arrived at the conclusion that the present site was the most economical as well as the most serviceable. House adjourned at ten o'clock.
