CLIFTON RACES.—The first interesting day's sport in ice racing took place Monday the 28th on the South West river, New London. The day was perfect and the ice all that could be desired. A large number of people from the surrounding districts attended and of course each one owned the fastest horse but time as in all other events of the nature told the tale. At precisely 2 o'clock the first race was called with the following entries:—Mikado B. G. by Parkwood owned and driven by Geo. Dennis; Malibus B. G. by Rampart owned by F. Taplin and driven by J. C. Durant; Roderick Dhu B. G. by Parkside owned by E. Dennis and driven by W. Chappell. The race was awarded them in the order named. But the event of the day came next when the judges called on the running race, a novel affair on ice, but one in which all who witnessed it were much interested. The nature of the race was announced by the judges, that "run or trot the first horse at this winning post gets the money." Although the kind of racing is exciting, in the interests of the people's welfare the old fashion of square trotting is the best and certainly the safest. The race money was awarded to Mountain Lamb, owned by G. W. Bell Stanley, and driven by Patrick Walsh, who by the way is an expert with a running horse, having driven in several events of this nature in years gone by, one on Blue Bonnets in Montreal, for the Queen's Plate and 100 guineas. Altogether everything passed off pleasantly. The judges were Frank Farrow, Capt. Robert Johnson and Jas. O'Connor. The starter was Geo. B. Slims. All of those officials discharged their duty in an impartial manner.
