Heat Affects Canadians In Boston Race

(By BILL KING Associated Press Sports Writer) BOSTON, April 19.—Leslie Pawson, 34-year-old Pawtucket, R. I. playground instructor, today became the fourth "repeater" in the 42-year history of the famous Boston Athletic Association Marathon by defeating Pat Dengis of Baltimore, regarded as the United States' greatest long distance runner, by almost a fifth of a mile.

Despite the mid-summer sun which shone down on the starting field of 180, Pawson's time for the 26-mile 385-yard journey over the torturous hilly course from Hopkinton to the Back Bay section of Boston was two hours, 35 minutes, 34 4-5 seconds, only four minutes, 33 1-5 seconds slower than the record he set when he gained his first triumph five years ago.

NOVA SCOTIANS FINISH Two Nova Scotians completed the long grind, Richard P. Beasley of Hantsford finishing in 40th place and Fred Duggan of Farmers A.C., Halifax, running 53rd. Patrick J. Kelly of St. John's, Newfoundland, was 39th. Pawson, with Arlington's Johnny Kelly, the 1936 victor, trailing by a step, forged to the front of the pack 11 miles from the starting line and they raced shoulder to shoulder for five more miles before the Rhode Islander shook him off and went on to win the title.

Cote Finishes Eighth The best Canada managed in today's race was the eighth-place finish of Gerard Cote of St. Hyacinthe, Que. His time was two hours 44 minutes, 1 2-5 seconds. Behind Cote in ninth place came Walter Hornby of Hamilton, Ont., in two hours, 44 minutes, 30 4-5 seconds. Next best Canadian was Hugo Kauppinen, New York, Ont., who won the race in 1934. He finished 13th in two hours, 49 minutes, 38 2-5 seconds, while Lloyd Evans of Montreal managed two hours, 52 minutes, 21 4-5 seconds to end up 19th and Bob Tilson of Hamilton, Ont., completed the Canadian contingent in the first 20 finishers by placing 17th in two hours, 58 minutes and 57 2-5 seconds.

As Pawson shook off Kelly, Dengis, who reached the first timing station, at the six-mile point, in 32nd place, was working his way through the field. He managed to overtake Kelly early in the last mile and lead him to the finish line by 53 1-5 seconds, about a 300 yards margin. Porter Places Fourth Mal Porter of New York, the National marathon champion, placed fourth. Others in the first 10 were Paul Donato, Boston; Mike Mansulla, Brockton; Clarence Demar, N. H., 46-year-old, several time winner; and Fred Ward of New York, who dropped back two places from his 1937 fourth position. Aside from Komonen there were three other former winners in the field, described by Demar as "the greatest I ever competed against."
