BEST VEGETABLES FOR THE FARMERS

List of Those That Have Proved Successful

By Experiment in the Horticultural Department of the Central Experimental Farm at Ottawa.

Farmers are often puzzled to know what kind of vegetables to select from the long list offered for sale by seedmen. Following is a list of the varieties which have given the greatest satisfaction in the Horticultural Department at the Central Experimental Farm, Ottawa, which should prove a good guide when ordering seeds.

Asparagus: Conover's Colossal is the best all-round variety, but this variety is more subject to rust than Palmito or Argenteuil.

Beans: Kenney's Rootless Golden Wax or Wardwell's Kidney Wax, for early crop; Early Refugee, for medium; and Refugee or 1,000 to 1, for late crop, are the most satisfactory dwarf varieties. Asparagus and Lazy Wife and Old Homestead are three of the best pole varieties.

Beets: Egyptian Turnip, Eclipse and Bastian's Blood Turnip are three of the best varieties.

Borecole or Kale: Dwarf Green Curled Scotch is the best.

Broccoli: White Cape.

Brussels Sprouts: Improved Dwarf is the most satisfactory.

Cabbage: Early Jersey Wakefield (early), Succession (medium), Late Flat Dutch, Drumhead Savoy (late), Red Dutch (red), is a select list of the best varieties of cabbage. For extra early use Paris Market. An desirable being a week earlier than Early Jersey Wakefield.

Cauliflowers: Extra Early Dwarf Erfurt and Early Snowball.

Carrots: Chantenay is one of the best, but if a good extra sort is required, the Early Scarlet Horn can be planted with advantage. It is a small variety.

Celery: Golden Self Blanching, (Paris Golden Yellow), Improved White Plume, White Walnut (early), Perfection Heartwell, White Triumph, London Red (late) are among the best.

Corn: Early Forehook, Early Cory (this), Crosby's Early, Henderson's Metropolitan (second early), Perry's Hybrid, Stabler's Early, Early Evergreen, and Black Mexican (medium); Stowell's Evergreen, Country Gentleman (late). In planting, the Country Gentleman should not be omitted, as it lengthens the season very considerably, and is of the quality.

Cucumbers: Peerless White Spine or White Spine, Cool and Crisp, and Giant Peter are three of the most satisfactory slicing varieties. Boston Pickling is a good pickling sort.

Egg Plant: New York Improved and Long Purple succeed best.

Lettuce: Black Seeded Simpson, The Morse, (and New York (curled), Improved Salamander, Unrivaled, Tennis Ball, Golden Queen (cabbage), Trisnon and Paris Cos lettuce make a good list.

Melons: Musk: Long Island Beauty, Hackensack and Montreal Market, of the Nutmeg type, and Surprise, Christiana, and Emerald Gem of the yellow fleshed types, are all good.

Melons, Water: Cole's Early, Imperial, Ice Cream, Phinney's Early are early water melons of excellent quality.

Onions: Yellow Globe Danvers and Large Red Wethersfield are two of the best onions in cultivation.

Parsnips: Hollow Crown and Dobbie's Selected are both good sorts.

Parsley: Doubled Curled is as good as any.

Peppers: Cayenne, Cardinal, Chili and Golden Dawn are 1 of the best.

Pease: Gregory's Surprise, Gradus, American Wonder, Premium Gem, (early) McLean's Advancer, Nott's New Perfection, Heroine (Medium). None of these are tall growing varieties. Stratagem, Juno (dwarf), Telephone (late). Excelsior is a promising second early sort.

Potatoes: Extra Early: Early Ohio, Early Andes (pink), Bovee, Burpee's Extra Early (pink and white), Early: Everett, Rochester Rose (pink), Early Puritan (white). Main crop: Carman No. 1, (white), Empire State (white), Late Puritan (white), American Wonder (white), Dreeer's Standard (white).

Rutabagas: Early: Scarlet White-tipped Turnip, Rosy Gem, French Breakfast, Red Rocket (red), Icicle (white), Late White Strasburg, Long White Vienna, Winter: Long Black Spanish Chinese Rose-colored.

Rhubarb: Linnaeus, Victoria.

Salsify: Long White, Sandwich Island, Spinach: Victoria, Thick-leaved.

Squash: Early: White Bush Scalloped, Summer Crook Neck, Late: Hubbard.

Tomatoes: Early: Sparks' Karlana, Main Crop: Brinton's Best, Trophy, Matchless (scarlet), Burpee's Climax, Autoerat (purple pink). There are many varieties of Tomatoes which are almost equal in excellence and productiveness.

Turnips: Early: Extra Early Millan, Red Top Strap Leaf.

Swedes: Champion Purple Top, Skirling's Improved.

THE LOCAL LEGISLATURE.

(Continued from page 2)

Mr. Smith resumed his speech on the address, remarking upon the general prosperity, for which our thanks were due to Divine Providence in giving good crops. The Government had assisted the general prosperity by giving us good laws. They gave us the Prohibition Act, and had greatly improved the road system, which is far superior to what it was before while costing \$15,000 a year less. He claimed the present Legislature had done more than any other since confederation to improve our finances. They had recovered a just claim of \$1,000,000, giving us \$300,000 a year, an amount nearly equal to the land tax. They had been waterfowl and energetic. The new revenues paid a large share of what is required to run the country. They had given attention to the representation question, neglected by their predecessors. If we cannot get our six members back it would be a fault of the Government. The fishery would belong to the Provinces and not to the Dominion, and we ought to get it back. He commended the effort to obtain a readjustment of the per capita and legislative subsidies, which, if secured, would give us enough to work on without further taxation. He hoped for good results from consolidated schools, and held that the interests of the farmers had never been so well looked after as now. The farmers got together in the Institute meetings and their discussions were highly interesting and educative. The distribution of pure bred stock was also a great benefit.

Mr. Matheson followed, remarking upon the fact that by fixing the by-elections so late members of the Opposition were deprived of the privilege of being present in full force at the beginning of the session. Referring to the representation question he said it was not a matter of controversy. The Opposition desired that the appeal to the Privy Council should be prosecuted with zeal and energy. He claimed that the Fishery Award was no further forward than last year, when the Government would have us believe they almost had the money in their pockets. Now they had got permission to state a case before the Supreme Court, in other words to sue the Dominion Government; that right had never been refused to any Province. I was prejudging the case to the decision would be in our favor. It is highly improper. No man knows what the decision will be. We were told in the speech it had received the favorable consideration of the federal Government, but a similar statement made in the N. B. Legislature had been denied by Sir Wilfrid Laurier, who said the matter had not been considered. As to the movement for increased subsidies to Provinces, he claimed it would be a loss to this Island. At present we get 80 cents per head upon our maximum population of 109,000. The new terms would give only 80 cents on the actual population, which is unfortunately decreasing, involving a loss by the last census of nearly \$5,000 a year, while the per capita subsidies to Ontario and Quebec would be increased to \$70,000 and \$240,000 each. All the money comes out of the people in the end, and to give these big increases for the west, which would go on increasing as their population grew, would be a wretched bargain for the Island. All that could be said of the representation and fishery questions was that we are possibly a little nearer the door of the court than we were last year. The same with the consolidated school. Not a bill had been driven into a shingle yet. Consolidation properly carried out would strengthen the schools, give better teachers better pay and tend to keep bright pupils at home who now go abroad. But neither the mover nor the seconder, who he complimented as making the best of a bad case, had given any real information as to progress made. He was surprised to see the member for Hampton (Mr. Smith) bow down and worship the Government, and give more praise to the Commissioner of Agriculture than to Providence. The Commissioner is going to school among the farmers to learn his business. He ought to go to Kings to get the finishing touches. He attended one meeting there and got a good lesson. Serious attention should be given to the Stock Farm. Reforms asked for had not been made. The Farm should be a place where farmers could go to inspect the best methods of cultivating and harvesting crops and of breeding, caring for and feeding stock. One farmer who applied for a Durham calf got an Ayrshire.

Hon. B. Rogers—No such thing ever happened!

Mr. Matheson—I think I can establish it as a fact. He would ask the Commissioner to bring down the correspondence on the subject with Mr. Dewar of New Perth. The Public Accounts were promised in the speech. He hoped the papers asked for last year and refused would also then be submitted, that the Public Accounts Committee, which was not called together last year would be called, and that information asked for in the House would be given. It had been said the trade of the Dominion had increased, but what had this Legislature to do with that? Also that immigration had increased. That did concern us as our money went to pay the cost of bringing in Doukhobors, Galicians and other cheap stock. The first consideration ought to be to keep our own people in the country. The Belfast Railway and Bridge were all right of themselves but the cost would be charged against us—what they cost, not what they are worth. When the bridge is completed we shall have to pay nearly \$10,000 a year out of revenue to help maintain it. This charge ought to have been avoided. He complained of the delay in the by-elections, which prevented
