CHAS. M. HAYS HAD \$150,000 ACCIDENT POLICY.

NEW YORK, May 7—All the life insurance companies having executive offices in this city, have decided to pay their losses on Titanic passengers, without further evidence that their policy holders on the Titanic were not among the survivors. Certificates by the steamship company that they sailed and were not rescued are to be accepted as proof. A complete list of the life and accident policy holders who were lost with the Titanic indicates that the companies total losses will reach almost \$2,000,000. The Insurance Field publishes a table showing the amounts of insurance carried by Titanic victims. In the list, it appears that Charles M. Hays carried \$25,000 life and \$150,000 accident insurance. Mark Fortune, Winnipeg, had \$14,000 life, and C. A. Fortune, \$17,500 life; T. Beattie, Winnipeg, \$4,000 life, and G. E. Graham, Toronto, \$2,000.
