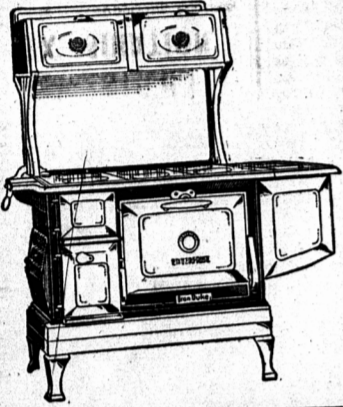

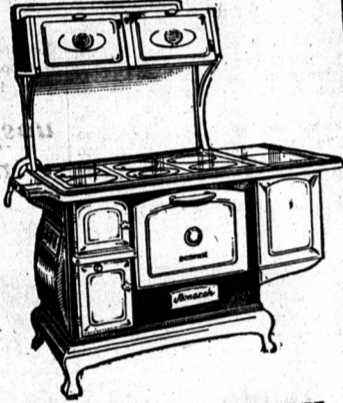

## Mme. Hanau Dies In Prison

(A.P. By Guardian's Special Wire) PARIS, July 20—An overdose of narcotics, taken in her jail cell, today ended the spectacular financial career of Mme. Marthe Hanau, "financial wizard" and the "woman Poni" of Paris.

Police immediately opened an investigation to determine how the narcotics reached the cell, in which she had spent six months of the three-year sentence imposed upon her at her last trial for swindling.

A report from the Fresnes Prison said Mme. Hanau, whose get-rich-quick schemes drew francs from the socks of thousands of small savers throughout France, had been unconscious since she took the overdose Monday.

## Map of Northern Labrador Finished

(A. P. By Guardian's Special Wire) OOSTON, July 20—An expedition to complete the map of Northern Labrador was announced today by Dr. Alexander Forbes, member of the Harvard Medical School Faculty and of the Board of Directors of the New England Grenfell Association.

Dr. Forbes said he and Charles J. Hubbard would start the trip at the end of July and expected to be away through parts of the area covered by surveys made by Dr. Forbes in 1931 and 1932, where gaps in the previous pictures needed to be filled in. These gaps comprise portions of the shoreline which were concealed behind taken in the photographs already taken and mountain valleys not adequately shown.

An airplane used in the original survey, Dr. Forbes said, would be chartered.

## CROP REPORT

Below will be found a brief synopsis of telegraphic reports received at the Head Office of the Bank of Montreal from its Branches. The branch managers have complete and intimate knowledge of each local situation and are in close touch with crop conditions in all sections of the districts mentioned.

### General

Crops in the Prairie Province, although about a week to ten days late, continue in a generally satisfactory condition. In Manitoba and Saskatchewan wheat is beginning to head out. The weather has been moderately cool and higher temperatures are needed to hasten growth. Light to drizzling rains have been received over wide areas, and moisture conditions are satisfactory except in southern Alberta and southwestern and west central Saskatchewan. In Quebec crops generally are progressing satisfactorily and having been commenced. In Ontario warm weather has been beneficial to crops, which are doing well, with heavy yields of barley and oats in prospect. In the Maritime Provinces conditions are now favourable for the growth of all crops. In British Columbia general heavy rains have brought the first crop of alfalfa, but should materially benefit later hay crops, grain and vegetables, though on Vancouver Island the rains came too late to repair drought damage. Details follow:—

### Prairie Provinces

Alberta: There is ample moisture in the central and northern areas but crops in the southern area are suffering from lack of rain. Beets are growing well. Pastures and ranges in the south are drying up. There have been some light scattered hail storms. Saskatchewan: Crops are making satisfactory progress with wheat fields heading out and a few fields heading out. Coarse grains, generally, are promising and pastures are good. Insect damage has been comparatively light, but heavy hail losses have occurred in scattered districts. Manitoba: Crops generally show vigorous growth. Wheat is a heavy stand and commencing to head. A light infection of red stem rust is reported in the Red River valley. Pasture is excellent and hay crops are heavy. Some damage from floods has been reported in limited areas.

### Province of Quebec

Haying should be general within the next ten days; a good crop is anticipated. Grass pastures continue in good condition. The growth of cereals is satisfactory and corn shows good progress. Root crops on high lands are progressing well. Strawberries are plentiful and other small fruits are promising.

### Province of Ontario

Wheat is filling well and maturing rapidly. Barley and oats are headed out and present prospects are for heavy yields. The yield of canning peas has been considerably reduced by an outbreak of aphids but a satisfactory pack is now in progress. Corn and root crops are making rapid growth, but show signs of retarded haying operations. Raspberries are now being marketed and a good yield is expected. Cherries, plums, peaches and apples promise well. Grapes are expected to be a good average yield. Present indications point to a good crop of both flue and burley tobacco.

### Maritime Provinces

On Prince Edward Island all grains are making excellent progress, but the crop of hay will be below average. Potatoes continue to do well. Throughout New Brunswick and Nova Scotia grains show a satisfactory growth; hay is expected to be an average crop and cutting has commenced in some sections. Potatoes are now progressing satisfactorily. Strawberries are abundant and other small fruits promise well. Apples continue to size rapidly and an average crop is anticipated.

### Province of British Columbia

New potatoes are moving to market under demand. Tomatoes and all vegetables indicate a good crop. Berry crops, now being marketed, are of good quality, but yields are small. Cherries have been badly split by rain and the crop is a 50 per cent of average. General crop conditions in the Okanagan and Kootenay valleys are favourable with fruit trees in satisfactory condition. Stone fruits were damaged by rain storms and now indicate a 50 per cent yield. Apples and pears are sizing satisfactorily and, while the crop will be less than in the previous year, good quality fruit is anticipated. Pasture on the mainland is now good.

## Canada Retains Her Place In World Trade

OTTAWA, July 20—Canada more than retained her place in fifth position in 1934 among the great exporting nations of the world, increasing her percentage of the total world export trade from 3.59 per cent in 1933 to 3.99 per cent last year says the weekly report of the Trade and Commerce Department. These figures, taken from the 1934 trade report of the League of Nations, show that Canada's percentage of world export trade was greater than in any year since prior to the depression. Although world export trade is estimated by the League of Nations' statisticians at only 34.4 per cent of the 1928 normal, Canadian exports are shown to be nearly 97 per cent normal, while in 1933 they were 34.4 per cent. Canada's status in world export trade has been maintained despite reduced movements of grain, indicating possibly increased shipments of manufactures.

An even better showing is expected for the current year as domestic exports for the first half of the year total \$300,265,000 as compared with \$289,659,000 in the corresponding period of last year. In imports, Canada has risen from the 11th greatest importing nation of the world in 1933 to 9th position last year. This has been mainly brought about by increasing imports of raw and partly finished materials for use in Canadian factories. Canada, last year took 2.60 per cent of the world's imports as compared with 2.28 per cent in 1933, and her import trade was classed by the League of Nations' statisticians as being 24 per cent normal.

## King To Open Campaign Via Radio

OTTAWA, July 20—Liberal Rt. Hon. W. L. Mackenzie King would open the election campaign of the Liberal party in three radio speeches. Speeches of the Liberal leaders will be on July 31, Aug. 2, and Aug. 5 from nine to 9.30 p.m. Atlantic Standard Time. The radio addresses will be over a nation hook-up of Canadian Radio Broadcasting Commission and independent stations.

## Mobilization Imminent

GIVES FIGURES

LONDON, July 19—(A.P.)—Sir Samuel Hoare, Foreign secretary, today informed the House of Commons Italy had shipped 75,000 troops through the Suez Canal since her quarrel with Ethiopia started.

Replying in writing to questions, the Foreign Secretary said: "While I have not detailed information, I am advised that up to July 6 approximately 75,000 Italian troops, together with 29,000 laborers, passed through the Suez Canal for the Italian colonies in East Africa."

The Cabinet prepared to meet again to reach definite decision on the Government's policy at the forthcoming special session of the League of Nations Council. Authoritative quarters denied reports that an Italian protectorate over Ethiopia had been considered in current Anglo-French diplomatic exchanges.

At the same time Sir Eric Drummond, British Ambassador to Rome, renewed efforts to get Premier Benito Mussolini's indication that he would be willing to discuss the full Ethiopian situation at the council session tentatively set for July 29.

## DRUG AIDING RECOVERY OF ADDICTS PATENTED

NEW YORK, July 20—The discovery of Resium, a new drug for the cure of narcotics addicts, was announced yesterday by Dr. Iwen I. Ostromislensky. Federal patents for the drug which is described chemically as diphenylmethylpyrazolonyl, have recently been granted. It is claimed by Dr. Ostromislensky that a six-day treatment with Resium will entirely remove the craving of an addict for morphine, heroin, cocaine, or opium. He says that taken in capsules by mouth, Resium relieves the physical suffering that always accompanies withdrawal of narcotics from an addict. Dr. Richard R. Panebianco, assistant to Dr. Randolph Wyman, deputy medical superintendent of Metropolitan Hospital, Welfare Island, said yesterday that Resium had been used at the hospital with favorable results, but that until further experiments have been made he could make no more definite statement. Dr. Herman E. Bauer, of the staff of Metropolitan Hospital, said that experiments with Resium at the hospital, had met with some success, but he also was unable to make a more definite statement at this time.

## Island Subsidy Claims Vitaly Dependant On Return Of Conservatives

The most significant Liberal statement in the present election campaign was made at Montague on Monday night by Mr. Thane A. Campbell, Liberal leader, when he admitted that "a balanced budget does not necessarily mean no increase in debt."

The whole Liberal appeal is based on the promise of making revenue and expenditure meet. Mr. Lea, in announcing the first Liberal platform, promised a balanced budget ON ORDINARY ACCOUNT. The three last words were deleted from the subsequent edition of the platform. Why was this done? Obviously to fool the people into believing that this would not be a repetition of the past Liberal record.

Fake Liberal surpluses on ordinary account have always resulted in INCREASED DEBT. Ex-Premier Saunders, who produced fake surpluses in 1928-1929, writing to Mackenzie King in December, 1928, complained that HE COULD NOT MAKE REVENUE AND EXPENDITURE MEET. His successor, Mr. Lea, who produced a fake surplus in 1930, presented claims before the Dominion Audit Board for \$438,000 FOR THE PURPOSE OF BALANCING THE BUDGET. The Audit Board, in reporting back to Ottawa, said: "The Provinces of Nova Scotia and Prince Edward Island showed DEFICITS in their Public Accounts."

These deficits were paraded as "surpluses" in the Liberal press!

A continuation of this policy is the only panacea the Liberal party has to offer for our economic ills.

It results under the Saunders-Lea Government in a debt increase of \$1,177,000, over half a million dollars of which was incurred in their last eight months.

That period, they say, was the most prosperous in Canada's history!

It was, according to Ex-Premier Saunders in his letter to Finance Minister Robb, "THE OPPORTUNE TIME" to have pressed our subsidy claims at Ottawa.

### WHY DIDN'T THEY PRESS THEM?

Not only did they fail to press our claims, BUT THEY REFUSED TO CO-OPERATE WITH THE MARITIME PROVINCES AND WITH THE MARITIME BOARD OF TRADE, WEN A JOINT PRESENTATION WOULD UNDOUBTEDLY HAVE FORCED THE MACKENZIE KING GOVERNMENT TO TAKE ACTION.

During that time, the people of this Province were paying more taxes into the Dominion Treasury than they have paid under the Bennett administration.

"Past history!" say the Liberal party leaders. "We are only concerned with the future finances of the Province."

WHERE WOULD THE FUTURE FINANCES BE BUT FOR THE THREE CONSERVATIVE SUBSIDY INCREASES, OF \$100,000, \$125,000, AND \$150,000 RESPECTIVELY, OBTAINED SINCE 1912 AFTER LAURIER HAD "BARRED THE DOOR"?

Where will it be in the future if efforts are not made to implement the findings of the minority report of the White Commission, which recommends further subsidy increase on the ground of fiscal need?

Mr. Thane Campbell, who in the event of a Liberal victory is likely to be the next Liberal Premier, says the minority report of the White Commission is valueless. The last settlement, he says, is "final and unalterable." THE VERY WORDS USED BY LAURIER IN 1907!

The policy of the MacMillan Government is to press this additional claim. THAT IS THEIR PLATFORM. The policy of the Liberal party is to ignore this claim, as they have consistently ignored our subsidy claims in the past. THAT IS THEIR PLATFORM, in which not one word about subsidy claims appears.
