W. S. MANSON, SUMMERSIDE, PASSES AWAY

Special from Guardian Correspondent SUMMERSIDE, June 29—The death occurred last evening of one of Summerside's most prominent citizens in the person of Wm. H. Manson after an illness of over two years, the last month of which he was confined to his bed. Death was caused by Bright's disease. Deceased was born at Kildare nearly 64 years ago and when very young moved with his parents to Cape Breton. When quite a young man he moved to California where he spent 5 years. On returning to the Province he was for a couple of years before the construction of the railway mail divert between Summerside and Charlottetown. About three years ago he settled in Summerside and for the past 25 years, has been business manager of the Hall Manufacturing Co., of which firm he was also a member. The late Mr. Manson was prominent in social and fraternal affairs of the town being a member of King Hiram Lodge No. 2 and A. M. and was also of Court Chataqua I. O. O. F. and was also a prominent member of the Baptist Church. He was an active worker in the Conservative party having several times refused offers of political honors. In civic affairs he always took an active interest being for some 10 or 12 years a member of the Town council during which time he gave a great deal of his time towards the welfare of the town. He leaves to mourn besides his wife one son Edward, of R. T. Holman, Ltd., also one brother, John, in Nebraska, and two sisters, Mrs. Herbert Yates, and Mrs. F. D. McLeod, both residing in Spokane, Wash. The funeral takes place tomorrow Friday afternoon at 2 p. m. from his late residence to the People's Cemetery with Masonic honors.—S.
