Railbirds Canny With Selections In King's Plate

EXPERTS CAUTIOUS REGARDING FAVORITES FOR POPULAR CLASSIC AT OPENING OF WAR YEAR RACING SEASON.

TORONTO, May 8 (CP)—Despite the war, plans proceeded throughout Canada for a banner racing season, headed by the 81st running of the King's Plate. Indications point to normal purses and crowds and a larger number of participating thoroughbreds.

Racing fever mounted here as the cream of the Ontario-fostered three-year-old crop turned into the drive leading to the King's Plate May 18. A late spring retarded training, but the advent of clear, warm weather conditioning of the eligibles was accelerated.

About a score of the 38 horses nominated for the classic at Woodbine Park remained on the hopeful list as trainers placed their charges on a rigid training diet. The field will take further trimming and by post time about 11 or 12 will answer the starter's bell to match speed and stamina in the mile-and-a-half event.

The big race, oldest continually run race on the continent, is fashioned for three-year-olds foaled in Ontario which have never won a race other than those exclusively for two-year-olds. Owner of the winner will receive 50 Guineas, donated by the King, a silver cup and the major portion of a \$7,500 added purse.

The race will lack much of the excitement which attended last year's running. Then the King and Queen were guests of the Ontario Jockey Club. After the race more than 40,000 persons watched the King present C. George McCullagh, Toronto, with the guineas.

Horses In Field

Seeking to retain the honors he won when Archworth sped to a handy victory, McCullagh has nominated a pair to carry his colors. Mons Memories and More Clothes have been placed in training, but neither is among the favorites.

The King's Plate was first run in 1860 when Don Juan won. It has continued without interruption. The first Great War did not force a suspension and the present war has failed to make any change.

The war, however, has given some fillip to Canadian racing. Racing associations expect more horses will be available this year than formerly. Usually it was the custom of leading Canadian Stables to divide their thoroughbreds, sending one division to the United States during the summer.

Minard's kills pain.

More Than Mounties For Provost Company.

OTTAWA, May 8—(CP)—In the formation of a Provost company for the 2nd division, Canadian Active Service Force, the department of national defence will look to other sources than the Royal Canadian Mounted Police.

The Mounties furnished the provost company of more than 100 men for the 1st division, now in training in England, and will provide reinforcements for the company as required.

The company is responsible for traffic direction and organization and other duties of a police nature in the division, work in which police experience and training is an asset.

For the 2nd division ex-politicians and members of provincial and municipal police forces available for enlistment probably will be chosen.

FIGHT JUDGE DIES

NEW YORK, May 9—(AP)—Thomas Shortell, veteran fight judge who thought Arturo Gasspari earned a decision over champion Joe Louis in their title fight last February died of a heart attack today while walking on a street. He was 62.
