FEAR POLYGAMY MAY FOLLOW WAR

Women the civilized world over are preparing to block any suggestion that postbellum polygamy be restored to repopulate the depopulated nations. The suggestion comes from a Prussian publicist, who has written a treatise to prove to German women that not only economic but religious reasons justify the bearing of children fathered by other men than their husbands, according to "J. 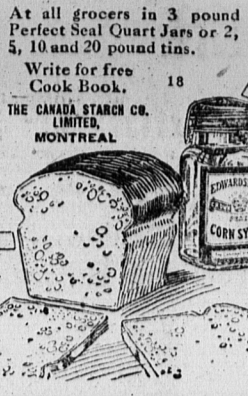

In the Light of Evolution

TREACHERY OF THE HUN

Colonel Kirkealdy of Winnipeg Had Narrow Escape.

Colonel Kirkealdy is wounded in hospital in London. He is doing well and is able to get about freely although still in hospital. His wound was incurred on the night of November 1st, when out in No Man's Land, where his men were making a sap.

A man seventy yards away called for help. The colonel thinking he was possibly one of our own wounded, ordered the remainder of his party to remain behind while he moved forward. Guided by the cries he got within twenty yards. Then the caller suddenly opened quick fire on him, the second bullet crashing into Colonel Kirkealdy's left shoulder. The colonel, who carried a rifle, dropped into a shell hole and blazed away in reply. Our troops on either side behind, not knowing that he had gone forward and believed the Germans were attacking, opened fire. Colonel Kirkealdy was thus between two fires.

Eventually he got back to the trench, whence after some adventures he walked, refusing a stretcher, to the dressing station. The doctor sent him back in an ambulance, beyond the Australian Hospital at Ypres. Here his battalion were unable to get in touch with him for three days. Consequently reports spread that he was dead.

IN MEMORIAM

MR. ARTHUR CROSKILL

The death of Mr. Arthur Croskill, took place at an early hour yesterday morning at his home on West Street. The late Mr. Croskill, who was in his 29th year had not been in robust health for some time, but was able to be out around until two weeks ago when he took to his bed. He was, for several years an employee of Messrs Carvell Bros., and about six years ago left the Island for New York. He remained in the latter place until about a year ago when he returned to his home in Charlottetown. He was a kind, lovable son and brother, and a general favorite among his friends. There are left to mourn his death a widowed mother, who is now at Sackville, on her way from Toronto, two sisters, Mrs. Gerald Brenner, and Miss Evelyn Croskill, at home, and one brother, John in France.

POLITENESS PAYS

We are too apt to regard politeness as a mere veneer. The pleasant smile, the spirit of helpfulness, the ready sacrifice are not of the exterior alone. A good manner, like the good-nature that is a part of it, is not a thing to be thrown on and off with a dress coat or a fine gown. It is of the man or woman, as the aroma is of the rose.

"The polite man is at a tremendous advantage. He can win favor and fortune under circumstances where the loose-mannered and slovenly-spirited is left to grumble in failure. It is not altogether because of the surface politeness; it is chiefly because of the sterling character that lies back of it and gives it force and effect.

"Politeness is good capital in any business. A Cleveland street-car conductor has proved it so, and so has every other man who ever made good manners a permanent part of his equipment. This conductor gave a little better service than he was supposed to be paid for. He was careful of the safety and comfort of the children, the women, the old men and the crippled who rode on his car. He met their complaints with pleasant smiles and kindly words. He collected no more fares for the company than any other conductor; he was no more efficient and faithful in other respects, perhaps than hundreds of his fellows. But, somehow, that one advantage was sufficient to distinguish him above others. He came to be selected for special runs where courtesy was of particular importance. And now he has been made a claim-adjuster, and his politeness is at a heavy premium. His kindness to others was unconscious kindness to himself.

"Politeness pays. It attracts friends and good fortune. It is a well-spring of good wishes. It creates about a man an atmosphere in which 'luck' likes to linger.

Synopsis of Canadian Northwest Land Regulations

THE sole head of a family or any male over eighteen years old, may homestead a quarter section of available Dominion land in Manitoba, Saskatchewan or Alberta. Applicant must appear in person at the Dominion Lands Agency or Sub-Agency for the District. Entry by proxy may be made at any Dominion Lands Agency but not Sub-Agency on certain conditions.

Duties - Six months residence upon and cultivation of the land in each of three years. A homesteader may live within time limits of his homestead on a farm of at least 90 acres on certain conditions. A habitable house is required except where residence is performed in the vicinity.

In certain districts a homesteader in good standing may pre-empt a quarter-section alongside his homestead. Price \$300 per acre.

Duties Six months residence in each of three years after earning homestead patent; also 90 acres extra cultivation. Pre-emption patent may be obtained as soon as homestead patent on certain conditions.

A settler who has exhausted his homestead right may take a purchased homestead in certain districts. Price \$300 per acre. Duties - Must reside six months in each of three years, cultivate 90 acres and erect a house worth \$300.

The area of cultivation is subject to reduction in case of rough, scrubby or stony land. Live stock may be substituted for cultivation under certain conditions.

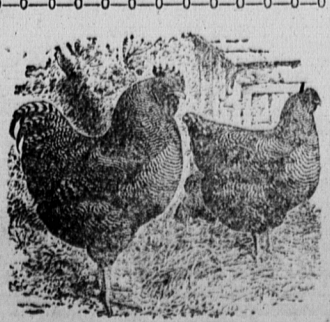
