NOT OPTIMISTIC (Continued from page 1) on the future for atomic energy. Some of it went like this: 'There'd be no need any more for coal or oil as fuel if the atomic energy could be used into commercial use. A small capsule of uranium, aspirin-sized, subjected to atomic disintegration gives off tremendous heat. The heat makes steam. Steam drives engines. Queen Elizabeth would drive the Atlantic crossing, would keep an automobile or airplane running for days without heat, a man's house for a year, would keep factory wheels spinning. But who'd control this power? A few private corporations or the government? If the government, how would it operate the power? With such a small amount of energy, we can get any atomic power would be used for water-power dams at all! That atomic energy may in time displace power dams, for he said: 'The fact that we can now use atomic energy makes us a new era in man's understanding of nature's forces. Atomic energy in the future will supplement the power that now comes from coal, oil and falling water. Which brings up this question: How cheap would the power be? Cheap enough to compete at all with commercial power plants? But do we, we can control atomic power for commercial use, give it to the rest of the world. It may be a long time before Canada, Great Britain and the United States, which worked together on atomic energy, will let the rest of the world know its secret. Yet that secret gives the three powers tremendous advantage over any other nation in wartime war. If the secret were shared, would wide, however, the consequences might be catastrophic. At some future time if the world's nations chose up sides and went to war they'd have in their hands the power to destroy one another and civilization, too.'
