Mrs. A. J. McPhee, North Lake, received the following letter from her son, Ancas P. McPhee, in France under date of Aug. 23. He was afterwards gassed on the 27.

Dear Mother:
 Well, I suppose you will wonder what has happened to me lately. But I have been pretty busy dodging shells and bullets and we all were so busy trimming "Fritz" that I did not have time to write until now. I suppose you have seen by the papers where we gave the Germans a bad beating and I can tell you it was the greatest day of my life, the day we went "over the top" after him. I can tell you it was some experience and one that I shall never forget as long as I live.

ground all around you and expecting every minute to get hit or killed, but I never thought anything about that for things were happening too fast to think of death. The Germans ran from us like sheep in some places and they fought to the end in other places was all the same to us, whether they ran or fought for we started out to beat them and we did it in fine style. The bravery and dash of our boys that day will never be beaten by any troops in the world, and they won a name that will never die. I had a bullet through my left sleeve and one took a piece out of my right arm, but I kept going until I reached the objective, and had my arm dressed. It was stiff and sore for a couple of days but is alright now and I feel none the worse for the experience. I was pretty tired when we got to our objective, and although there were some shells falling around where we were. I went to sleep the moment we got "dug in". The day was very hot and we had a heavy load to carry, ammunition and bombs, etc. and it was pretty hard work. We went on the next day and captured a lot of prisoners and guns, etc.

Frank Grady was wounded but the rest of the boys are O.K.

My platoon Commander was killed at the first start and we miss him very much, for he was a fine fellow, and was very good to us. While we were waiting in the trench that morning to go over the top, he divided up his last cigarettes and tobacco with us, and we were all in fine spirits, laughing and joking about what we were going to do to old "Fritz" when we got started, but poor fellow he only got a few hundred yards when he was killed by a sniper. But that sniper will never kill any one else, for we all fired at him the same time.

The weather is very warm here now and was right for the push. The prisoners we captured were a pretty hard looking lot, old men and young boys, about 15 years old, but of course, there were some good big men among them too. They all had a dejected look on their faces and were glad to get out of it alive and be taken prisoners. The Germans are beaten every way and I would not be surprised to see peace by Xmas, but still it may go on through the winter. It is hard to tell how soon, Fritz will squeal, but he is bound to do so in a short time, perhaps sooner than we expect.

Well I guess I will close for this time, but will write soon again. With lots of love to you and father and best regards to all, I am as ever. Your loving son

meet the new conditions and demands. There must be a unity of command and action as in the war. Premier Lloyd George and President Wilson had to fight for the idea of unity of command but they got it and with victory. So much we in Canada in our coming campaign. Indeed, already there are signs of unity of action in the great co-operative scheme in force in the West and Ontario. In the latter territory last year overlapping between the Methodists and Presbyterians has been eliminated.

Forty fewer Missionaries have been employed in North Ontario and more families reached and many thousands of dollars saved by co-operation in service.

Dr. Gandler exhibited a chart setting forth the Presbyterian part in the home and foreign work which is on the church's programme. He also gave the numbers of men and women on the staff.

The Canadian staff abroad is 302 and this staff is responsible for the oversight of 14,000,000 heathen.

The speaker also presented a birds eye view of the Institutions—Colleges, Art College, Schools etc in foreign lands and showed how co-operation is working wonders there also.

In unfolding the fields Dr. Gandler graphically described the equipment and needs of the many fields with their teeming millions. Korea drew the special interest of the Synod. Amid applause Dr. Gandler announced that 25 years after the first missionary went to Korea there was the first meeting of the General Assembly of Korea, an achievement without a parallel in missions since the Apostolic age.

The speaker announced that within the next five years there are 70 men needed positively in addition to those now needed. 39 Evangelists, 19 Educationalists, 12 medical men.

In reference to the sum needed for equipment and expansion it will need to be \$611,700. Then for the maintenance of the work we need \$750,000 at the very lowest calculation. At the end of five years we will need an annual Budget of \$720,000. The total income for foreign missions in 1917 was \$325,215.
