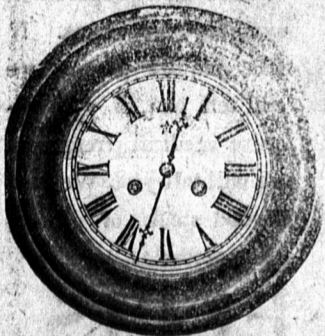

YOUNG MINER STARTS WONDERFUL REVIVAL

Evan Roberts Fills the Valleys With Singing Converts in Crusade Against Conventional Formalism-- Religious Movement.

The religious revival in Wales, the antics of dancing derishes from Denver, Col., and the publication of the life of Father Ignatius, in which the power of working miracles is claimed for that curious latter day monk, are providing for London newspaper readers a triple bill of strongly sensational flavor.

It is some weeks since Evan Roberts, the young miner of Porth, South Wales, received what he described as a call to raise the fallen, convert the ungodly to Christianity and stamp out drunkenness. "The ears of the deaf shall be unstopped," he said, "and the tongues of the dumb shall sing," and truly there have been many hitherto heedless of religious duties whose ears have drunk in Roberts' fervid oratory, and thousands whose tongues, hitherto dumb, are spreading "the fire," as it is claimed, by singing and preaching.

Even public houses have been invaded and converts captured at the bars. Football clubs have been converted en masse. The whole Rhondda Valley, holding a quarter of a million inhabitants, notorious for a loose manner of living, has been brought to see "the light." The villages in the valley are being linked up nightly with the lights of chapels. Not since the memorable Loughor revival, which began in 1859 and lasted eighteen months, has there been seen such a tremendous religious upsurge and not even then during the whole time it lasted did it spread with such rapidity as on this occasion.

Spreads Over All Wales.

The revival, though less than a month old, has spread from South to North Wales, where Roberts and his converts are carrying "the brand" which unstops all ears and commands the tongues of the dumb to sing everywhere.

The greatest excitement is manifested. No matter where one goes, over all Wales the incidents are the same. The results of the methods are the same. The streets are deserted, shops and public houses do no business, everybody is at chapel, and yet the correspondents who are following this extraordinary revolution agree that it is as yet only beginning. "How is this?" as one of the Welsh papers in an editorial says.

One of the curious features of the revival is the very subordinate part played by the regular ministers of the chapels. They are rather following in the wake of the young revivalists, Roberts, who has converted them to his methods. In fact, the revival seems to be, first, a sort of passionate protest against the conventional formalism of regular service and of the ordinary sermon, and, second, the great majority of those directly influenced are men and women in the heyday of youth, who, flushed with triumph, bring into play an enthusiasm which is overwhelming and an earnestness that brooks no resistance.

One Welsh correspondent, who has been taking a flying visit over most of the ground where the revolution is at work, says: "Everywhere the churches of all denominations are vivified and stirred to activity. No longer content with the hoary system of exclusive meetings for exclusive worship, they have become centres of aggressive operations, in which workers are plentiful and the desire for work all consuming."

Roberts' Personal Magnetism.

Another important factor in the spreading of the revival is that the Welsh newspapers have caught the infection, and there is scarcely a meeting at which there are not present crowds attracted from distant towns which the voice of Roberts has not yet reached by the voluminous, thrilling reports of the daily press, and these visitors returning home carrying with them a flying visit over most of the ground where the revolution is at work, says: "Everywhere the churches of all denominations are vivified and stirred to activity. No longer content with the hoary system of exclusive meetings for exclusive worship, they have become centres of aggressive operations, in which workers are plentiful and the desire for work all consuming."

While he speaks every eye is riveted on him, every ear seems strained, as if afraid a single word should be lost, and at the end are seen tear stained features, while Roberts stands throughout wreathed in smiles. Young men and maidens, old men and veteran ministers, and preachers gray in service, pastors scholarly and ambitious deacons and elders solemn and austere, spectated students, who have deserted their lessons, all follow in the young revivalist's train.

Then, when the meeting comes to the end, the new converts are escorted round the streets, amid the joyous singing of hymns. "We've been too long singing in a minor key," says Roberts. "A church that can't sing when sinners return home must have something out of place. Therefore, sing and rejoice." And they are singing and rejoicing all the time.

One correspondent, who has been in Wales studying the revival and who has had acquaintance with revival work in all parts of the world, gives it as his conviction that the movement will not confine itself to Wales; that it will spread all over England, and even take London or a portion of it by storm.

Chaos Through Dancing Derishes. But of all the curious shapes that recent religious revivals have taken there is none more remarkable than the dancing derishes of the churches of the Burning Bush and the Pillar of Fire, who have started giving

visual evidence of their religion to Londoners at Canterbury Baths. The first night they appeared, after being well advertised, the huge building was crowded by spectators, more in expectation of entertainment than in seeking the truth.

The platform had hardly been occupied by Mrs. Obadiah White and her chosen seven, than the audience showed signs of impatience.

Why didn't they dance? They hadn't come to hear any preaching, some of them cried.

The preacher stopped. The chosen seven rose, stood in line and sang what was evidently meant for a hymn. Though very vague, it seemed to have an inspiring effect, for it drove them to dancing. They hopped higher and higher, till they dropped back again to singing.

After a sort of cakewalk in embryo the performance closed, without call for either collection or repentance, for chaos reigned.

On the second night thousands struggled for admittance to the baths, fighting and tearing at one another for the best places of vantage in the big hall. The pentecostal lieutenants made wild efforts to quell the tumult, but it was not till Mrs. White appeared, held up her hands and signed for fair play that the uproar ceased and the meeting proceeded in peace.

Unlike the Welsh revival, however, it is not yet recorded that there has been a single convert brought to the fold of the derishes or any other fold.

Miracles of Father Ignatius.

The life of Father Ignatius is described as the most remarkable biography that has seen the light of day for many a year.

It would seem as if the Father had been selected as an habitual worker of miracles, though in many cases the miracles do not seem to have had any merciful use.

During his first curacy at Plymouth Father Ignatius visited a punishment upon innocent offenders which appeared rather excessive, taking the nature of the offence into consideration. A woman had turned the curate from her door with strong language.

"Then," to quote the Baroness de Bertouch, who is responsible for the biography, "the avenger which loosed the plagues upon gorgeous Egypt and wrote the flaming message on Belshazzar's wall swooped down and smote the firstborn in that shabby little house."

In later years to quote another instance of the miracle working powers of Father Ignatius, a woman who had cursed his bald head suffered a miraculous dispensation which caused the hair of her boy to fall off at her feet. "I have been emphatically assured," says the Baroness, "that in the twinkling of an eye the lad had become absolutely hairless."

Father Ignatius, too, was a stern disciplinarian. A book tells how he made ladies of his church lie down in cinders, men carry guttering candles and boys receive stripes at the altar for attending a local dance in a hall that once belonged to a monastic order in mediaeval England.

The total of the estimates is \$33,644,807 compared with \$62,935,383, which was the main estimate last year.
