life at his residence in Minneapolis, Minn., on the morning of August 10, 1909. He was in failing health for a short time before his death being troubled with weak spells caused by the heart failing to give proper circulation to his blood. On the morning of his death he arose and dressed himself, but on coming out of his room was overtaken with a weak spell and died shortly afterward. He was born in Invergorie, Scotland, May 16, 1833, and came to Prince Edward Island in July 1860. Settling at Dundas where he engaged in farming at Cumberland Hill and later in business at Dundas. He was a Justice of the Peace for a number of years and also Clerk of the County Court. He was an elder in the Presbyterian church at Dundas for many years. All of these duties he performed to the best of his ability and in the fear of God. In 1886 realizing that the West afforded greater opportunities for his family he removed to Minneapolis, Minn., where he resided till his death. In 1870 he was soundly converted to the Lord and experienced the Saving grace of Christ in his heart, under the powerful preaching of the Rev. Alexander Sterling a noted Presbyterian Minister of P. E. I., and from that time to the day of his death lived a true consistent Christian life and died in the triumphs of the Christian faith. Shortly after coming to P. E. I., he was united in marriage to Miss Maggie McIntyre of Scotland, who with her only child died in 1864. In 1868 he was again married to Miss Elizabeth Ann Wood of Dundas who survives him. To them were born two sons and six daughters all of whom survive him excepting one daughter who died in infancy. The funeral service was held on Thursday afternoon, August 12th, from his late residence, conducted by Rev. M. B. Hedding, pastor of Western Ave. Methodist Episcopal Church. He was laid to rest in the beautiful Lakewood Cemetery where to await the resurrection morning. "Blessed are the dead which die in the Lord from henceforth: Yea saith the spirit that they may rest from their labors, and their works do follow them." - W. A. McK.

NOVA SCOTIA EXHIBITION AND SPLENDID RACING MEET

The Departmental Buildings at the Provincial Exhibition Will be Completely Filled - \$7,000 for Speed Competition.

The Nova Scotia Exhibition this year comes off a month later than last - the dates of opening being Saturday, September 25th. The fair will continue to the following Saturday. This will give agriculturists or fishermen and mechanics, a more favorable time for making exhibits, while the general public will have an opportune time for visiting and enjoying the fair. The indications are that the exhibitors fully appreciate this, for already the applications for space in the Main building and the outlook for exhibits in Machinery Hall are as promising as for the Dominion Exhibition. The Live Stock is likely to be in excess of what has been seen in the past. The Prize List amounts to \$20,000, and the splendid exhibits that are assured in the Agricultural and Horticultural departments will make competition keen. The prospects for the Nova Scotia Fruit Crop are most promising and its excellence will be reflected in a superb exhibition at the Fair in Halifax. Every Nova Scotian who wished to keep in touch with the progress of the Province should see the 1909 Exhibition at Halifax. The Grand Stand will be occupied

in the afternoons by crowds gathered to see the fleetest horses that Maritime Provinces can produce. There will be seven days of races for purses aggregating \$7,000. Twenty races will come off, so that the races for each purse will average nearly \$400.00. The usual low excursion rates will prevail on the Railways, and the prospects are that with a splendid exhibition and a great racing meet the attendance will be very large.

SCIENTISTS DISCUSS CATTLE BREEDING

WINNIPEG, August 28 - The feature of this morning's session of the British Science association were two delayed presidential addresses of the zoological and physiological department by Professor Shipley and Professor Startling. Professor Shipley thought governments should give naturalists and zoologists more assistance. He hoped that millionaires would come to their assistance and help equip expeditions. In the engineering department Colonel Anderson, of the marine department, Ottawa, explained what had been done to make the St. Lawrence safe for navigation. He thought with properly constructed ships the river could be made safe the year round. In the agricultural department there was an interesting discussion on cattle breeding in Western Canada, it being the general opinion that prairie farmers would soon go more into cattle raising. It was pointed out that long winters were not preventive, as in Scotland and North-

ern Europe best beef countries, cattle were stable seven or eight months in the year. A splendid residential address, in which the destinies of great nations and of man were dealt with in vigorous style, was delivered by Professor Startling, of the physiological section. He took up the question of race development and the problem of the future of the British empire. An entire subordination of each part to the welfare of the whole is the lesson which he thought the English-speaking races have at the present time the most need to learn. It has been the problem of the United States, it is the problem which faces the empire. "The same sort of difficulties which confronted states," he said, "is being experienced in the integration of the units nominally under British control into one great nation, in which all parts will work for the good of the whole and for mutual protection in the struggle for survival."

A PROVINCIALIST HAS PASSED AWAY

Alexander McDonald, Captain of Police, has passed away from cerebral hemorrhage, at Providence Hospital.

Since July when Capt. MacDonald was stricken suddenly at police headquarters, his life has been despaired of. For a time the end was momentarily expected. A week ago there came a change for the better. He regained consciousness for a time and even walked for a day. Friday he suffered a relapse and sank gradually until yesterday afternoon, when another stroke resulted fatally.

As a superior officer, Capt. MacDonald was rated unusually competent. After the election of Mayor John F. Miller, friends of the officer who died yesterday urged his appointment as chief of police, and the selection of the head of the department was made between McDonald and Ward.

Captain MacDonald was appointed to take the place of Irving Ward when the latter was named chief of police by Mayor John F. Miller. Since that time until he was suddenly stricken, he was a patrol commander.

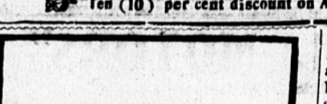
