On the boat with him returning to Canada were sixty "Japs" sent to the United States and Canada to study new inventions and new manufactures.

SCHOONER SAFE.—Mr. Henry Benoit, city, received the pleasing assurance yesterday that the schooner General Middleton, Capt. Hicks, which left Annapolis on December 15th with a cargo of produce for Halifax had arrived there safely after being detained at Liscombe, halfway between Hawkesbury and Halifax, by unfavorable weather. This vessel was loaded by J. M. Morrow, Annapolis.

STILL ICE BOUND.—The Canadian Steamer, which made an attempt to reach the Magdalen Islands last Friday and failed, tried again yesterday and was obliged to return to Souris. The Captain now thinks that it will be impossible for the Steamer to reach her destination without assistance and efforts are being made to get the Montreal to convey her after she has released the Canadian Spinner. It is understood that there is serious need in the Magdalen of the cargo on board the Steamer consisting of produce and fishing supplies.

PRESIDENT'S ADDRESS.
Following is the President's address in full:—
Charlottetown, P.E.I., Dec. 30, 1919.
In looking back over the year that has passed we see great cause for thankfulness to God for His goodness to us as an Association. Gratifying progress has been made in every department of the Institution.

Financially the Association has prospered, a large amount of money has been raised, and friends have contributed generously. A complete new heating system has been installed, and the roomers are now not only properly heated but bright and attractive as well. When we consider the amount of work done and the improvements made in other ways the financial outlook is indeed most encouraging.

The Physical Work has been most attractive to very many young men and boys. This is a valuable department of Association activity and still better results could be attained if the gymnasium were provided with a new floor. A large number of classes was held with a good average attendance.

Educationally the Association has maintained its accustomed standing. The reading rooms are well stocked with desirable periodicals, and books. Practical talks etc., also have been outstanding features.

The Y. M. C. A. has been pleased to co-operate with the Protestant Churches of the City in placing the C. S. E. T. Programme before the teenage boys. There are at present five Tuxis and six Trail Ranger Classes meeting on Sundays in their respective Churches, and once a week in the Y. M. C. A. The boys receive training in the four-fold way: Bible Study, Socials, Educational Talks, Physical Training. The attendance at these meetings is about 135.

Examinations were conducted in Bible Study last Spring. 32 boys wrote tests and 42 secured certificates having made 75 per cent or over. Camps for Trail Rangers and Tuxis Boys were held in July at Victoria, with a total attendance of 92. Hikes, Socials, Hobby exhibits, Father and Son Week, and Conferences also featured in G. S. E. T. Work throughout the year.

The Y. M. C. A. has endeavored to be of real service to the men in khaki as they returned from overseas. A military Secretary was placed in Charlottetown, whose duty it was to aid the soldiers in every possible way. The men also received a six months' free ticket to the privileges of the Association, and very many have taken advantage of the opportunity to attend gymnasium for recreation. The reading room, billiard room, bowling alleys, and showers baths have also been well patronized by them.

The Ladies Aid have again as in other years proved themselves of great assistance to the Association. By their willingness to assist, their generous gifts of money and furnishings they have made possible many improvements to the building, and added to the effectiveness of the work carried on by the Institution.

The Membership of the Association has increased. A few members have left the city within the past year. We record with deep sorrow the following deaths from among the supporters of the Association:—
