CHICKASTER, Ky., July 1. (Special) - A negro who committed a criminal assault on a sixteen year old girl was hanged and burned here by a mob last night.

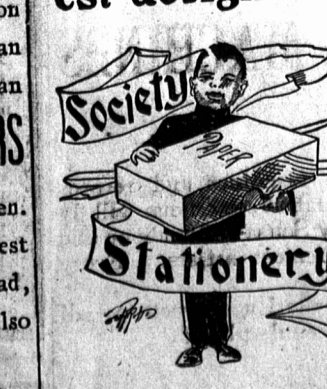
SAILOR DROWNED AT HAWKESBURY

TERRIBLE TRAIN WRECK ON AN ENGLISH RAILWAY

Traffic Derailed While Going a Mile a Minute, Kills Twenty-three Including Three Canadians - Narrow Escape of Mayor McClellan of New York - Worst Accident for Years - Inquest in Progress.

SALISBURY, England, July 1. (Special) - The American Line special from Plymouth carrying forty-seven passengers who had embarked last night from the steamer New York from New York June 23, was wrecked at Salisbury, 83 miles from London at 2 o'clock this morning.

Among the dead are Walter Barwick, the celebrated lawyer of Toronto, Ont. Rev. E. L. King, Toronto, A. C. Pison, Toronto and some others whose addresses are unobtainable.

The train had passed Salisbury station at a very high rate of speed over a mile a minute, when at a sharp curve just outside the station the locomotive jumped the track and plowing up the rails, crashed into the west-bound freight train.

There were three passenger coaches in the train. The first of these shot past the locomotive and crashed into the railway bridge and was smashed into splinters.

portions of the wreck being hurled completely over the bridge. The second and third passenger cars were toppled over on the line and completely destroyed.

Mayor McClellan of New York, who was a passenger on the steamer, did not embark at Plymouth, but went on to Southampton and reached London this afternoon.

He escaped accident by the merest chance, having changed his mind and deciding to remain on the boat after the steward had thrown his baggage in the tender with that of the others.

John E. McDonald, the New York horseman, who is among the dead, was given the compartment reserved for Mayor McClellan.

Frederick Henry Cossett, who was killed was a prominent society man who had been married June 13th to Miss Dugro, daughter of Judge Dugro and they were on their honeymoon.

that he was the second person present to lose his life in a sensational manner. Stanord White, who was shot by Harry Thaw was a guest at the wedding.

The engineering staff of the railroad company are still seeking an explanation of the immediate cause of the derailment, but thus far have been unable to do so or are not ready to say to what the catastrophe is attributable.

No further deaths have been recorded. The inquest began this afternoon when only formal evidence was taken and the inquiry was adjourned.

The bodies of the dead are still in the wrecking rooms of the railroad station where no relatives are available. Identification of the dead will be made by the doctor and purser of the New York.

The bodies of the American victims are being embalmed for conveyance home.

CELEBRATION OF DOMINION DAY

Victoria Park The Centre of Attraction - Regatta and Races at Summerside - Picnic to Vernon River - Excursion to Pictou Private Picnics.

St. John, July 1. (Special) - Dominion Day was very quietly celebrated here today, hundreds going out of town on excursions to the country or to various places where celebrations were held.

The centre of attraction was Fredericton where the Firemen's Tournament and sports were held.

A Conservative political picnic at Gagetown was a great success; about four thousand attended to hear speeches by R. L. Borden and others.

On the whole Dominion Day, which was celebrated yesterday, was quietly but thoroughly enjoyed.

In the early morning many anglers might have been seen leaving the city for the haunts of the speckled beauties and later the trains, special and regular took into the country more fishermen.

A number left by the special and many more by the regular train for Summerside to attend the regatta and the horse races which took place at the Western capital, and of which an account will be found in the Guardian's Prince County column.

The excursion by the S. S. Northumberland to Pictou claimed a number of pleasure seekers, and also some of our young athletes, who went over to compete in the sports held at Pictou by the local athletic club.

The picnic at Vernon took many by train, and the splendid opportunities provided by the Island railway as a means of spending the day happily were taken advantage of.

Driving was largely indulged in. There were many enjoyable trips, no doubt, where notwithstanding the heat of the day the temperature in the carriage in most cases was only in the shade.

The strong breeze blowing over Charlottetown harbor, while it tempered the sun's rays, probably was the reason why boat sailing was not indulged in to any great extent.

For those who stayed in town Victoria Park was the chief attraction. In the morning the troops encamped there were hard at work, the 82nd regiment and the Artillery drilling, and the Field Ambulance corps being inspected by Colonel Jones, the Principal Officer of the Mar-

time Provinces, who arrived by the Northumberland on Saturday night.

In the afternoon there was a large crowd of spectators, and the troops afforded them an interesting program. The 82nd were deployed as attacking and defending forces, the latter entrenched till in due course the trench was captured with a wild charge, and cheers proclaimed the victory.

The appearance of the Light Horse upon the scene was greeted with expressions of pleasure, and Captain Macdonald, after the 82nd had most creditably gone through some battalion drill, put his troopers through their troop and squadron drill, and also dismounted the troopers, sending them forward as skirmishing line.

In their own section of the park ground the signalling corps were busy the men working hard at their important duty. It is pleasing to see the progress that has already been made by the signallers.

The different corps encamped at Park gave a pleasing touch of variety to the scene, and a visit is the source of much pleasure.
