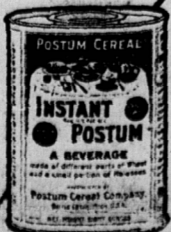

produce them, but the clear cold fact is that nothing, which was procurable from Liberals, was purchased from supporters of the Conservative party. But in varying amounts, from a few dollars up to as much as \$15,625.12, the supplies were purchased from the political supporters and dealers of the Bell Government. In that choice language of their organ the Patriot the invitation was literal to their friends to "Come to the crib and get your fill," and they came.

Touching his right to hold on to the purse strings of office, in defiance of the demands of the people for a general election, Mr. Bell sought refuge behind Premier Meighen's utterance, that he had a parliamentary majority behind him. But the cases are entirely different. Premier Meighen was standing by and carrying out the policy of which the people approved and which they were elected to carry out. Moreover, not in the whole broad Dominion was there a meeting of the people or his supporters to call upon him for his resignation. Added to this he had the endorsement of three out of four constituencies in bye-elections, by largely increased majorities, running up into the thousands, all asking him to remain at the helm. But the Bell combination have the direct opposite of this. Their policy is diametrically opposite to the one upon which they appealed to the people. They have violated every pledge or promise upon which they received their original mandate and have trampled the commands of the electorate beneath their feet. And the people by the medium of public meetings, through the press, by personal demands and by every method in which the could make their wishes known, HAVE DEMANDED THE RESIGNATION OF THE GOVERNMENT, AND A RETURN TO THE PEOPLE OF THE TRUST PROCURED FROM THEM BY THE MOST SHAMEFUL OF FALSE PRETENSE.

Mr. Bell then got back to his allegation that the late Government spent \$110,000 in the Public Works Department, but with a somewhat changed and more cautious tone, "for the manifest purpose of carrying the election." He has been repeatedly challenged to prove a single dollar of this statement, and his organ the Patriot was compelled to take back-water on the same charge last summer, but up to this moment they have not pointed to a red cent of improper expenditure by the Arsenault Government. His willingness to repeat this slander has so frequently asserted itself that we feel like carrying the charge into his own camp, AND WE DO SO WITH STRONGER EVIDENCES OF ACCURACY than he can command. During the last year Mr. Bell's Public Works Department expended, exclusive of the Highways cost, \$201,688.83 and left over \$18,000 UNPAID BILLS. Now if out of a total expenditure of \$163,000 the late Government mis-spent \$110,000, by the same reasoning how much was mis-spent by the Bell combination out of their \$219,000? It is a simple question in arithmetic. A legitimate expenditure of \$53,000 deducted from \$219,000 leaves the Bell Government's improper expenditure at \$156,000, AND NOT IN AN ELECTION YEAR AT THAT.
