Debate On Budget Ends

OTTAWA, Nov. 28 - (CP) - In a quick windup of the public budget debate, the Commons tonight voted 141-47 against a Progressive Conservative motion of non-confidence in the government.

A few minutes earlier the House had rejected by a vote of 162-77 a C. O. P. sub-amendment to the Progressive Conservative motion.

The C. O. P. and Social Credit groups voted with the Government against the Progressive Conservative motion.

Progressive Conservative and Social Credit members joined with Government in defeating the C. O. P. motion.

The sub-amendment, moved last night by M. J. Coldwell, C. O. P. leader, expressed regret that the Government had not proposed an effective full-employment plan which would require the use of national credit in terms of public works.

The sub-amendment disposed of the House immediately began various resolutions and amendments relating to the Progressive Conservative motion of want-of-confidence in the Government.

Reveal How Allies Foiled Axis Radar

WASHINGTON, Nov. 28 - (CP) - An eerie form of electronic warfare - radar - counter measures that blinded and confused the enemy's radar "eyes" - helped greatly to bring the Axis partners to their knees, it is revealed by a new book.

The complete story of a titanic battle in the ether in which various Allied scientific devices jammed German and Japanese radar sets or fooled them out of the play at crucial stages of the war, was told by the United States Office of Scientific Research and Development.

It is mainly the story of three ingenious schemes: The employment of millions of pounds of radio-reflecting aluminum foil, wrapped in tiny strips or long ribbons from a variety of shot aloft in shells and rockets from surface vessels. The foil, giving back an "echo" to searching enemy radar sets, served to screen Allied craft from the foe's radar beams.

The development of a system of radar jamming by which the location of enemy sets was mapped all the way from Anzio to Berlin and from Kiska to the China Sea. This was based on devices for detecting and analyzing radar beams of varying frequencies and for determining the direction from which the beams came.

More Nazi Treachery Revealed At War Trial

Hess Found "Not Insane," Court Arranges For Britons To Give Evidence.

By NOLAN NORGAARD - NURNBERG, Nov. 28 - (AP) - A trial of Nazi treachery accusing German leader and their Austrian "quailing" Arthur Seyss-Inquart of engineering the conquest of Austria was unfolded today before the International Military Tribunal.

The two defendants singled out as the chief architects of the Anschluss were Seyss-Inquart and Franz von Papen, both of whom testified unconvincingly as prosecutors.

Sharing the spotlight was Rudolf Hess, former deputy Fuehrer, who continued reading his 12th book in the courtroom as the tribunal announced that a board of psychiatrists had found he was "not insane" in a strict sense of the word.

The tribunal will decide Friday what his status will be. Dr. Gustav Fischer, a German lawyer for Hess, expressed the opinion that his client probably would be tried in absentia.

The court disclosed a ruling under which 10,000 German soldiers will remain behind indefinitely in the Occupation Force. The Navy registered itself and offers no problem.

About 100,000 personnel were moved home in the six months following VE-day - 12,000 ahead of the program drawn up last before the end of the war.
