### MRS. C. O. POLAND

Mrs. Mary I. Poland, widow of Colonel Poland, a Boston fire captain, passed away yesterday at the home of Mr. and Mrs. John S. Potter, 14 Lily St., where she had resided for some time. She was in the shadow of 90, having been born at Charlottetown, P. E. I., on March 20th, 1850. She was the daughter of Wm. M. and Isabel (McGraw) Thompson, and had been in this country most of her life. She had resided in Malden 27 years. Her husband was long a Boston fireman, having been head of Hose 3 at Roxbury.

During her residence here Mrs. Poland made many friends. She was especially interested in the soldiers, and during the World War worked unceasingly with the knitted stockings, sweaters, and wristers for them. Her work was brought to the attention of President Wilson who awarded her an honor certificate in appreciation of her work. (The lady mentioned above was the Women's Relief Commissioner of the Reading Corps. She was also a Reading Corps member for many years, and has been chaplain of the Veterans of Foreign Wars auxiliary. She counted among her best friends, Mayor John D. Devis, and P. M. Loring, State and Soldiers' Relief Commissioner of Malden. Her husband died several years ago and she is survived by a son, Foster E. Poland, who has been ill since the 92nd, and death was due to a form of heart trouble and asthma. She had been under the care of Dr. Gray—Malden, Mass. Ezech. The lady mentioned above was a sister of Mrs. John James, Euston Street, City.)

Bishop Nelligan's fine art of interspersing the seriousness of his remarks with humor was quite apparent during his address.

To those who had previously had the opportunity of hearing the Bishop it was a renewed treat and to those who had not had the first time informally, the evening will be long remembered.

In the course of his remarks the Bishop addressed the marked broads being made by the Communists in Canada and warned the gathering of the great need of Christian men uniting against this great enemy of the church.

Among those who attended the meeting were Dr. W. J. P. MacMillan, who taught Bishop Nelligan in primary school, several of the members of the local college and seminary chums, all of whom referred to their association with the Bishop in former years.

The vote of thanks was moved by Rev. Patrick McMahon, D.D., and seconded by Brother Leo F. MacDonnell.

Other speakers included His Excellency Bishop J. A. O'Sullivan, Rev. J. A. Murphy, D.D., Hon. A.E. Arsenault, State Deputy W.J. MacDonnell, and Grand Knight Philip Rossier.

The presentation of a travelling bag from the members was made by Past State Deputy H. P. MacPherson.

Rev. Bernard Gillis and Past Grand Knight A.R. MacInnis rendered pleasing vocal selections.

## Passenger And Mail Traffic Shows Increase

A large increase in passengers and mail traffic to the Magdalen Islands from here by the Canadian Airways for this season as compared with the same period last year, was noted in figures released last night.

Air service to the Quebec Province governed Gulf Islands from Charlottetown is maintained when the ice in the Gulf of St. Lawrence makes it impossible to reach the lonely group by water, although several "mercy flights" have been carried out by the Canadian Airways during summer months.

Twenty-one round trips have been made to the Magdalen Islands from Upton Airport so far this winter compared with 13 for the same period last year. During the 21 return flights the twin-motored Dragon machine, equipped with two-way radio communication for the service, has carried 38 passengers and approximately 12,600 pounds of mail—600 pounds a flight.

During the same period last year when the Canadian Airways operated their machines without the use of two-way radio 13 passages were conveyed to the Gulf Islands and about 8,200 pounds of mail—850 pounds a flight.

A small amount of express has been transported.

Two flights to the Magdalen Islands scheduled for yesterday were postponed until today owing to weather conditions.

## Rotary

At the Rotary luncheon yesterday the speaker was Lieut. Col. G. Elliott Full, president of the Charlottetown Board of Trade who spoke on the work of the Rotary Commission in Charlottetown, dealing especially with the board of Trade brief.

He pointed out that Prince Edward Island was not as prosperous as was generally represented to be. For instance, her per capita production income was \$177, and that of Saskatchewan on the same basis of calculation and despite her droughts was \$177, and whilst for the whole of Canada the amount was \$217 per capita.

In 1925 the island's production amounted to seven-tenths of one per cent of what was produced in the United States. Markets had to be found in Upper Canada and in the industrial centres of the Dominion, which is therefore, the province should receive special consideration with regard to transportation of farm products and fish to these markets.

The expenditure on social services is much less in Prince Edward Island than in other provinces.

It was also pointed out that Charlottetown is not receiving her same share of grants for direct relief as the other cities are per capita.

Colonel Full also made reference to a Loan Council, the general question of taxation, including the income tax.

With regard to succession duties, he cited a case of one estate in Prince Edward Island which had bequeathed \$100,000 to charitable purposes, but as this consisted in part of stocks and companies in Quebec, where shares were transferable, that province collected about 23 1-2 per cent in succession duties.
