MOVEMENTS OF THE MARKET.

MONTREAL, March 30.—(Special)—The Stock Market was a shade better today

for the most notable feature being the loss of two points in Dominion Iron Bonds which at the opening sold at 73.

Dominion Iron Common sold at 26 at the opening, and dropped to 25, but recovered to 29, and again lost a point at the close. Preferred sold, down to 60.

Dominion Coal opened at 108 1/2, sold down to 107, recovered to 109 but lost at the close.

Nova Scotia steel sold from 98 to 98 1/2 and Canadian Pacific at 123 downward to 127 1/2.

SAN ANTONIO, Texas, March 28.—The Sunset Limited on the Southern Pacific and a passenger train collided at Lacoste, eighteen miles west of here last night.

Three passengers were killed, nine injured. The bodies of the dead were buried.

STUDENT SENTENCED.

TORONTO, March 27.—At Brockville, Jas. Hutton, the Queen's University student arrested at Lindsdown, the night of March 12th, was brought before Judge McDonnell for trial this morning and was sentenced to two months in the Common Jail here. The prisoner's counsel requested that the charge be altered to that of robbery, which was consented to. Hutton pleaded guilty to this charge.
