**A PUBLIC LIBRARY**  
The need of a public library in this city is almost universally conceded, but there have hitherto been found some insurmountable difficulties in the way of supplying the want. The thoughtfulness and generosity of the late William Dodd has now apparently opened the way to a realization of that object. Mr. Dodd bequeathed the sum of \$500 to the Young Men's Christian Association for the express purpose of founding a library. He saw and felt the public want and took the most direct and effectual method of causing it to be supplied.

Doubtless the generous donor above named had in his mind the stimulating effect his action would almost certainly have upon the generosity of other citizens. It is indeed a well-known fact that generosity is infectious in the better sense of the word, and especially in regard to matters of public utility. What was doubtless intended by Mr. Dodd was that his bequest should be the nucleus around which other generous donations should be gathered—a nest egg which would be surrounded by other eggs that would in the due time fill the nest. It is in this sense that the Y. M. C. A. are disposed to interpret Mr. Dodd's generous intentions and give them effect. They intend to ask for subscriptions to enlarge the sum at their disposal for library purposes before investing the sum they already have in books.

The Y. M. C. A. rooms will afford fairly suitable shelter for a public library. The location is central and convenient of access. The custody and management of the library will be safe with the Association, but if needs be one or more representatives of the subscribers to the library fund might be associated in a sort of joint commission with the officers of the Association. Some definite scheme ought to be formulated that will give satisfactory assurance to subscribers that the money they donate will be judiciously invested in books and that the library when formed will be prudently cared for and readily accessible daily or on stated days or evenings of the week. With this done we are satisfied that many will not only be found willing, but eager to assist in proportion to their ability.

There ought to be some generous contributions to this worthy object from our wealthier and more public spirited citizens, and such we trust may be obtained, but it is also desirable that as many as possible of the entire citizenship should be induced to subscribe. The more money the better library we shall have and the more subscribers there are the larger will be the number who take a genuine interest in the success of the enterprise. There is truth in the saying that where a man's treasure is his heart will be, whether in religion or business. There is not the slightest danger of too much money being obtained, for the simple reason that the treasures of literature are unbounded and ten thousand dollars, were that sum available, could be as readily invested in valuable books as could one thousand. And the investment in a public library will be found to be a good and profitable one in the highest sense of the word. Every city, town or village that has made the experiment has found it so, and every populous centre that has neglected the formation of a library has suffered serious loss. In these days nothing can atone for that lack of general information and culture which is supplied by reading.

As a means of raising the required subscriptions it has been suggested that the Association should apportion the work of soliciting moneys to, say, ten of its most active and popular members, with the stipulation that each one of the number should undertake to get one hundred dollars subscribed. Each solicitor would be permitted to secure the assistance of as many persons of both sexes as he could find to help him in obtaining at least the stipulated hundred, with as much more as could be got. These

would be the smaller and more general subscriptions of ten dollars each or less. In addition it would be hoped that some donations of fifty, one hundred, or larger sums, might be forthcoming. This is merely a suggestion. But it is to be hoped that with a fair amount of effort and a generous response Mr. Dodd's donation might be increased to \$1,500 or \$2,000. To the library thus formed additions could be made in future years.

It transpires that the Khedive of Egypt is acting a sullen and ungracious part toward Great Britain just now. He sent no congratulation to General Kitchener after his recent victories and did not even take notice of the splendid achievements of the Egyptian troops. The fact that he owes his position as Khedive to Britain, adds ingratitude to his jealous churlishness.

As the numerous colleges resume work in the autumn there are reports of the brutal and idiotic practice of hazing. Various means have been suggested to put a stop to the practice but without effect. And yet the remedy would be easy and effective enough if each college would but refuse to matriculate any student who would not pledge his word of honor that he would have no part or lot in any such business.

The general election in the Northwest Territories is fixed for 4th November next and a vigorous campaign is now in progress. There is no Dominion politics involved, the government and opposition being both made up of a fixture of Liberals and Conservatives. The election is of interest to the Dominion, however, from the fact that a large portion of the money by which the territorial government is carried on is provided from Ottawa. Last year the federal treasury supplied \$357,859 for that purpose. The territories are desirous to have a provincial status as soon as it can be obtained and it would be of advantage to the Dominion in a financial way to concede what they wish. In that case many services that are now paid for by the Dominion would become chargeable on the province.
