St. Stephen's was read by Rev. C. U. MacNevin of Dominion. Prayer was offered by Rev. M. A. MacMillan of New Waterford. Rev. Murray MacDonald, Sydney delivered the address to the new minister and Rev. J. W. O'Brien of Reserve gave the address to the congregation. Benediction was pronounced by Rev. MacCallum. A social hour was then held.

—The condition of John Cullen of Bonaventure, formerly of St. Theresa, who was involved in a train-car collision on Thursday evening, is still critical, according to the latest report from the Prince County Hospital last night. His sister, Mrs. Thomas Gallant is also in hospital but her condition is not serious. The accident, which occurred at Dickies crossing near Borden about six o'clock Thursday evening, took the life of Mr. Cullen's mother, Mrs. Joseph Cullen of St. Theresa, who died shortly after being taken to the hospital. Mr. Cullen has two fractured arms, a compound fracture of one leg and a fractured jaw.

—Mrs. Gallant is suffering from shock, cuts and bruises and possible concussion. The accident occurred at a crossing having an open view and it is understood that the engineer, Mr. Ernest Deighan of Summerside threw the locomotive into reverse in an endeavor to avoid a collision. The deceased woman, Mrs. Cullen, was visiting her son and daughter in Borden Monday at the evening he was taking both of them to Summerside to see a show.

A coroner's jury was empaneled immediately after Mrs. Cullen passed away under Coroner Dr. Austin Delaney of Summerside, and viewed the body and the scene of the accident before adjourning till called. It is not expected that the inquest will convene for a few days because the testimony of the other occupants of the car will have to be taken.—S.

Large Freighter Loading Potatoes At Summerside

Perhaps the largest freighter ever to enter Summerside harbor arrived at seven o'clock yesterday morning. She was the "Sun Valley" of 10,000 registered tons, here to loan a cargo of 60,000 bags of seed potatoes for Norfolk, Virginia. The freighter is of Canadian registry, her home port being Port Alfred, Ont., and she has a capacity of 120,000 bags.

The freighter came to Summerside direct from New York and her cargo is being loaded by I.B. Willis Inc. of Charlottetown. The McFarlane Produce Co. of Summerside are attending to the stevedoring. If fine weather continues it is expected that the boat will be loaded by Monday and will sail sometime during that day.—S

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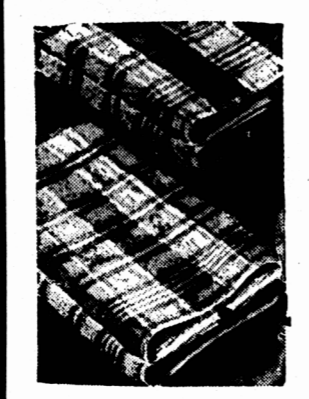
