Kimball, explained the new rates, and the reasons for the increase. The meeting did not take any action, but the whole question will be discussed at the annual meeting in Charlottetown in August. New York, Boston and Worcester papers all tell of agitations started with the idea of bringing about a reduction that will make the rates more equitable to old men.
