TRACADIE FARMERS INSTITUTE HOLD EXHIBITION.

The sixth annual exhibition under the auspices of the Tracadie Farmers Institute was held today. Year by year these exhibitions have gained in size and importance, proving that the agriculture of the district is progressing. The exhibition of this year is, it is stated, the best of all. Certainly it is highly creditable to the people of Tracadie.

It was held in the building, which was the church of the parish, before the present grand new church was erected. The building is now the centre of Tracadie's agricultural and social life, and in every way suitable for the purpose.

The exhibits set forth in it today compare very favorably with the best we have seen in this Province this year. In grain they are exceedingly fine.

Some of the oats in sheaf measure 5 feet, 2 inches in height after being cut by the machine and the wheat in sheaf would be counted excellent even on the prairies of the West.

Five turnips, grown by Robert Young weighed 32 pounds and one new-spike and spaw from the turnip sown by Mr. Mullin weighed 19 1/2 pounds. H. F. Brown. 10-1MBE.

The potatoes are some of the largest and some of the best we have seen this year and among the exhibits are mangels and other root of first-class quality.

The show of vegetables is excellent and the apples are well grown and colored.
