AT A GREAT ARCHITECT GONE.

Daniel H. Burnham, the eminent Chicago architect, died the other day in Heidelberg, Germany. He was more than an architect; he was a prophet—the Prophet of Civic Beautification.

City planning was his hobby. Erecting modern office buildings was his business. A few of the latter which owed their being to him were the Masonic Temple, Chicago, the Illinois Trust Building, and the Marshall Field Store, the Mills Building in San Francisco, the Eliott Square Building in Buffalo, the Society for Savings Building in Cleveland, and the Flatiron Building in New York.

The noble civic plan towards which Chicago is working was designed by Mr. Burnham. Cleveland owes to him its proposed Court of Honor. Washington is becoming more attractive

through the advice and inspiration of Mr. Burnham. Brooklyn and San Francisco are his debtors. He believed that it was abundantly worth while to make a city an attractive place.

In a recent address he said: "Get the right start. Begin by making your people enthusiastic. Go after them and keep on going after them by speeches, pamphlets, charts, and lectures. You must have the people behind you before you can do anything for a city. Show them that it pays in dollars and cents that a city should be beautiful. Do this and the rest will be easy. The way to plan for an undertaking of this magnitude, is to look upon the city as a place of residence and a place of business for those who will come in the future. This is the ungodly side and the side for those who are willing to sacrifice for the future. This does not mean a mere fad, a mere interesting thing which you should go into because you enjoy the novelty of it. It means that today men have arrived at a certain level of intelligence and having arrived there they inevitably desire to have good air, wide spaces, a place for the children to play in."

Charlottetown and this Province in general could profit by the advice of Mr. Burnham. Probably the newly appointed and esteemed Provincial Publicity Agent will lead the way in the matter.

WHAT THIS PROVINCE WANTS.

Some of the Road Masters are doing good work on the public highways of this Province, but there are many whose efforts are but partial, and thus roads are left in a decidedly objectionable condition. The former, after having the road machine carry the sods and clay into the centre of the roadway, traverse it with a disc harrow which cuts up the sods, after which a tooth harrow levels the clay, etc., and a good road is the result. When this is not done the sods make the centre of the road so rough as to be almost impassable, and in many cases the carriage track is forced down by the edge of the ditch, rather than in the centre of the highway. We hope that no pains will be spared to make the roads of this Province the best possible, as they are certainly one of its most valuable assets. Especially is this true in the matter of marketing produce, for no farmer can be found who does not prefer a good road, well drained, to enable him to move as large a load as possible, with a minimum of exertion to his horses. Persons visiting in this Province have frequent occasion to drive through the country on pleasure, but they are not likely to take many trips unless the roads are in good condition. We all want good roads and good roads we must have.

NOTES.

William T. Stead was for many years the most influential journalist in the world, and played a prominent part in international affairs in his time. He had the faculty of readily impressing his readers with his originality, and thus causing them to become deeply interested in his articles. Yet he died worth but \$65,000. Charles M. Hays was a great railroad magnate, whose control over men and whose executive ability were almost without a parallel. Yet, we are told, he died worth but \$100,000. Each of these men was regarded as having accumulated ten or more times as much of this world's riches as they really were.

THE COST AND ESTIMATES DIFFER.

OTTAWA, June 12—Messrs. F. K. Gatielus, and G. Lynch Staunton, K. C., commissioners inquiring into the construction of the Transcontinental railway, have returned from an inspection of the line east and west of Cochrane. Part of the trip was made by handcar. Evidence was taken at several points. The commission also intend to visit other parts of the road in Quebec and New Brunswick and will not be ready for some months. The fundamental object of inquiry is to determine the extraordinary discrepancy between the estimates and the actual cost.

SUFFRAGETTES SMASH DUBLIN WINDOWS.

DUBLIN, June 13—A campaign of window smashing was opened today by the Irish suffragettes, who tried to emulate the deeds of their English sisters, but came in vigorous conflict with the authorities. After the women had made an energetic attack on most of the public buildings, eight of them, who were armed with bags of stones, were arrested and are to be brought up before the police magistrate. The women before the police came on the scene had set siege to and succeeded in shattering 42 windows of the custom house, the post office, the land commission office and the police and military barracks.
