elves into a life of material pursuits which gradually robbed them of their sense of duty to God and consequently their duty one to another.

As we remember today the men with whom we marched and camped, and who were with us in our own time, it is for us to rededicate ourselves to the service of God, seeking through prayer a revivification, a new consciousness of His Presence, and acknowledging our sins of waywardness and selfishness, we rededicate ourselves to the service of men in the name and spirit of Jesus Christ, and thus give meaning and purpose to our remembrance.

God in His providence has given us possession of many powers over the forces of nature, too often we have accepted these gifts of God, without accepting the responsibility that is always involved in the gift itself. Therefore it is urgent that each of us give ourselves to the duty which God has given us, that all His gifts may quickly become the instrument of the progress for which God has given them, namely, the glory of God through their spiritual enrichment.

Again the Christian Church has our message above all else, turn to God through His Son, our Saviour Jesus Christ, and thus give meaning and purpose to our remembrance.

who had been in war-torn Europe, could say. And yet it could be questioned whether or not we were deserving of this privilege, whether or not we were free from those sins which corrupt society and lead to wars.

In the social work in which he happened to be engaged before this war, His Excellency had seen ample evidence of the evils that the last war was supposed to have banished but which, in fact, were rather leading to another war.

On Armistice Day our minds should turn first to those millions who made the supreme sacrifice, he added. "Next we should remember those bereaved in the conflict, and finally those who were crippled for life in the ruthless battle."

World Peace

His Excellency prayed that the joint sacrifice of these world leaders to attain peace in the attainment of this, which is the greatest blessing of this world today, is harder than it was after the last war because of the much deeper and more fundamental social ability of the world today.
