THE CASE PREJUDGED.

It may perhaps strike the lovers of fair
play as somewhat singular that two
gentlemen first named on the committee
of inquiry as matters published in The
Guardian are the two gentlemen who
have pronounced judgment in advance
against this journal. Here are the words
of Captain Read as reported in The Guar-
dian of April 4:

Captain Read in seconding the motion
(for the appointment of a committee) con-
demned the articles in question. The
charges made had intended to intimidate
every member of the House. The insinua-
tion had gone forth that every member
who intended to support the bill was

And here is what Hon. Benjamin Rogers
is reported in The Patriot to have said
during the same discussion:

Hon. Mr. Rogers said the resolution be-
fore the House is not only in the interests
of the member charged, but in the inter-
ests of the House as well. If newspapers
go on charging that members endeavor
to pass a bill because they are the paid agents
of the company it is time they should be
called to account.

It must be sufficiently clear to any fair-
minded and unbiased person that no
Judge of any court in the land who had
thus in advance of a hearing condemned
one of the parties to a controversy, could
be permitted to conduct a trial in regard
to such controversy. We know of no
Judge who having so expressed his con-
demnation would consent to try a cause
between the party he had censured and
an opposing party. Equally true is it that
no man who had so expressed himself
would be competent to sit as a juror to
try a cause between the party he had im-
pugned and an opposing party. He would
be subject to challenge for cause and would be promp-
tly challenged by the litigant or counsel
for the litigant whose cause he had prej-
udged adversely. And if he were a high-
minded man, or possessed of a sense of
judicial fairness he would ask to be ex-
cused from sitting as a juror on the
ground that he had already made up his
mind, or had already expressed an
opinion.

We are not now objecting that Mr. Ro-
gers and Capt. Read might not under
other circumstances and conditions be
fair and desirable members of this or
another committee. We are not objecting
that in their places in the House they con-
demned The Guardian. Our argument is
that having so condemned The Guardian
in advance they are debarred from adju-
dicating upon the matter in controversy.
This argument is based upon a principle
of justice which is recognized where-
ever the British flag floats in the breeze.
It is based on a principle
recognized in every judicial tribunal
high or low wherever the British language
is spoken. It is a principle which is dear
to lovers of liberty and justice every-
where. Yet in the interests of a cor-
porate company seeking what we believe
to be undue advantages by unfair means
this principle of fair play has been set
aside.

But the two members of the committee
of whom we have spoken have not only prej-
udged our case. They have censured this
journal for what it has not done or said.
Captain Read says our words were "in-
tended to intimidate every member of the
House." He implies that we have insin-
uated that every member who intends
to support the Peaking Company's bill
is paid to do so. We meet this censure
with a flat denial. We have not sought to

intimidate any member of the House,
and no reasonable construction
of The Guardian's language will
bear out his statement as to intimidat-
ion. Nor have we stated or insinuated
that any member has been or would be
paid for his support of the bill. We have
not even stated or insinuated that any
member intended or was likely to vote in
any other manner than would be dictated
by his honest convictions. This applies
with equal force to Mr. Rogers' remarks.
We have in no case charged that mem-
bers are endeavoring to pass a bill be-
cause they are the paid agents of the
Company.

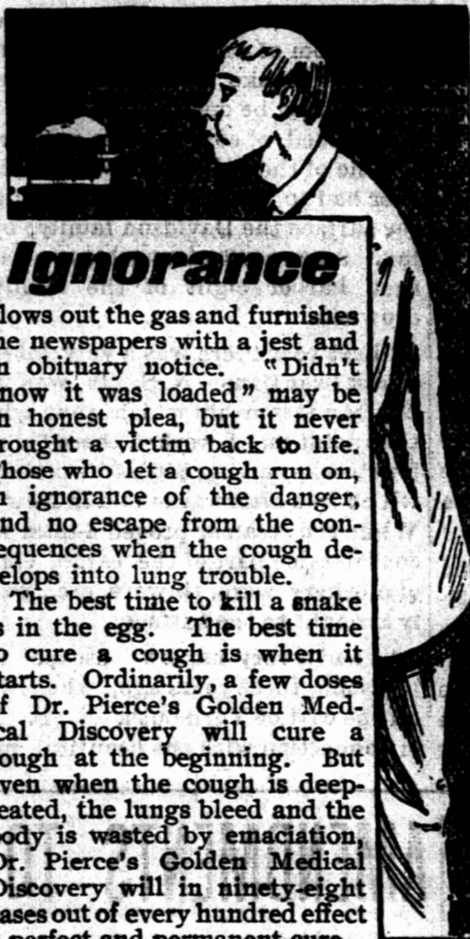
We have suffered these aspersions to
pass in silence for nearly a week, but as
we have waited for day after day without
any intimation down to the time when
we write this of the committee being
called together, we cannot permit the
statements of Hon. Mr. Rogers and Cap-
tain Read to remain longer unchallenged.
We will not longer consent to remain
silent. No such prejudiced and perverted
statements ought to be allowed to go
forth uncontradicted into general and
permanent circulation.
