The death occurred in Malden, Mass., January 19, of pneumonia, of Patrick Cairns, a native of Newlon, Lot 23. The deceased left this Island thirty years ago for Malden, and has since resided there. He was 57 years of age, and leaves to mourn a wife, one son, together with one brother and three sisters. Interment took place at Holy Cross Cemetery, Malden.

The Boston Globe of January 21st, contains the following account of a divorce case which will interest Prince Edward Islanders: Ida E. Turner was married on July 17th, 1894 at Dundas, Prince Edward Island, to H. Havelock and they came to Boston in the following March.
