Although moods and temperaments change with a change of hats, there are basic types of faces and figures which look best in certain basic types of silhouettes and colors.

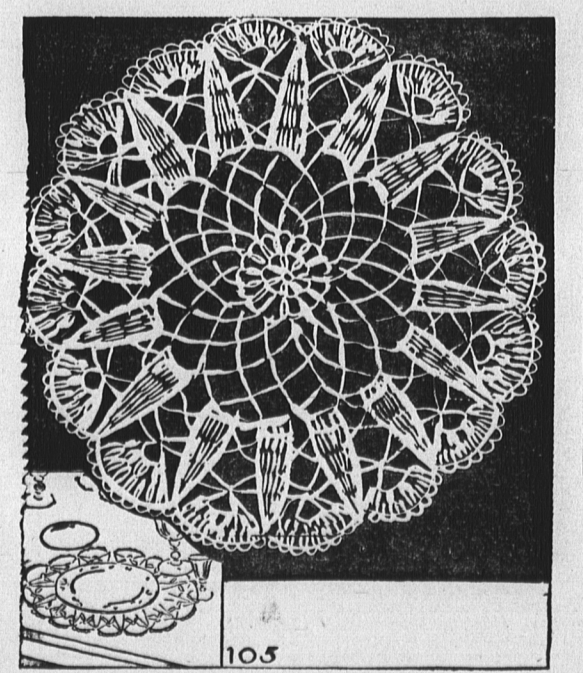
A woman with a long, thin face will appear to advantage in a hat that has a low crown and broad graceful uneven brim. High-piled turbans and broad-brimmed hats with high crowns do not complement her features as well as the graceful brimmed hat. A broad brim that is absolutely straight will not do as much for this type face as brims that are dipped or gathered for flattery.

At Disadvantage Without Hat

Women with long, square faces are at a disadvantage without a hat, just as no woman is at her best unless she is wearing a hat. But with a model that softens the jawline, a diagonally tilted brim which is neither straight up and down or straight across, their faces will appear to be more nearly oval—the ideal type.

The short-square jawed face is also a problem type. But there's a hat to flatter this kind of face too. The brim and coiffure together should be a little wider than the jawline to minimize the width of the lower face. Diagonally tilted hats also enhance the looks of this type of woman.

KEEPING UP WITH JONESES BRINGS DAY OF RECKONING

Living Beyond Your Means Can Bring Nothing But Sorrow And Ill-Health

One of the curious manias of women is wanting to know people who do not want to know them, and to run with those whose pace they cannot keep. Sometimes men also are afflicted with the keep-up-with-the-JoneSES neurosis that yearly sends its thousands of victims into the bankrupt courts, and sanatoriums and the grave. That no other malady known to medical science is so much to be dreaded as this mental aberration is not to be denied, for once its infection takes hold of a household peace and contentment and happiness are gone and there is no health left in it. And, in particular, it has the power to change a woman's whole nature and rob her of her last vestige of sanity. THE COOK'S CORNER

BREADED COFFEE RING

2 cups flour
2 teaspoons baking powder
1-2 teaspoon salt
5 tablespoons shortening or butter
2-3 cup milk (about)
Beaten egg yolk
Sugar

Method: Sift the flour with the baking powder, and salt. Cut in the shortening or butter with two knives, or a pastry blender, until the mixture is in fine crumbs. Add enough milk to make a soft dough. Turn the dough out onto a lightly floured board or canvas and knead lightly for a few seconds. Cut the dough into three equal pieces. Roll each of these, using the hands, into long narrow strips. Break the three strips together and shape into a ring. Place on a greased baking sheet. Brush the top with beaten egg yolk, then sprinkle with granulated sugar and the chopped almonds. Bake in a moderately hot oven (425 deg. F.) for about 25 minutes, or until done. The best is rolled up like a jelly roll, then formed into a ring. This one is filled with jam and a thin icing may be brushed over the surface when it is taken from the oven.

BAKED POTATOES

Wash and dry the potatoes thoroughly and place them in the oven. If doing them with the chicken, they will require about 1-1/2 hours baking. When the potatoes are done, you can prevent softness from developing by making a cross on one side of the baked potatoes as soon as you get them out of the oven. This allows steam to escape. Now pick them up singly in a cloth and squeeze them a bit to loosen up the insides, thus making a little of this bulge into the cross-cut slash.

PIQUANT DRESSING

1 cup mayonnaise
2 tablespoons catsup
1-2 teaspoon Worcestershire sauce
Dash of pepper

Method: Combine the ingredients thoroughly and chill well before serving on lettuce wedges. Be sure that the lettuce also is well chilled and is crisp.

LEMON CHIFFON PIE

1-2 cup lemon juice
Gruated rind 1/4 lemon
1 cup sugar
1-4 teaspoon salt
3 eggs, separated
1 tablespoon gelatine
1-4 cup cold water
Baked pie shell

Method: Combine the lemon juice and grated rind, 3-4 cup of the sugar, the salt and egg yolks which have been beaten. Cook over hot water until the mixture is thickened. Sprinkle the gelatine over the cold water and let stand for 5 minutes. Add the soaked gelatine to the hot egg mixture and stir until the gelatine is dissolved. Cool well.

"An unfortunate necessity," the Chief murmured.

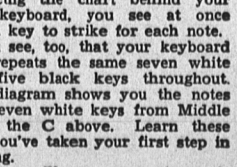
"Please let him loose. Please. I'll do anything if you promise not to leave him like this. If he starves to death you will have committed murder."

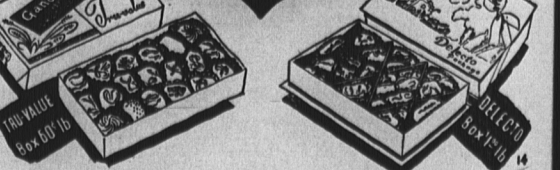
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
