OUR BOYS AND THE MEDALS.

In the course of his grand tour through the Dominion His Royal Highness the Duke of Cornwall and York is personally distributing to the returned Canadian soldiers the medals to which they are entitled by their faithful and valiant service in South Africa. It is a rare honor to receive these medals from the hands of our future King, and this honor is easily accessible to the men of the contingents whose homes are in the Mainland Provinces. The Duke in passing will visit all the principal centres there.

Now nothing is clearer than that all the Canadians who served in the war should be treated with equal consideration. As the Duke is not coming to Prince Edward our boys should have been afforded the opportunity to meet him at some point in New Brunswick or Nova Scotia where they could have received their medals in the same manner as their brother soldiers from the other Provinces. We regret to learn that an application to Ottawa for transportation to St. John on the Government Railway proved unsuccessful, the answer being that there are no funds especially set apart for such a purpose. We think the federal Government has a clear duty in the matter, and hope their decision may be reconsidered. Failing that it would be a graceful act on the part of the provincial Administration to see that our boys are not compelled to go to St. John or Halifax wholly at their own charges. It is by no fault of theirs that the Duke is not coming to this Province.

In Columbus, Ohio, the proprietor of the Press-Post, which had made some offensive references to the late President McKinley, was with difficulty rescued from a mob of 1,000 indignant citizens. The papers were seized and burned by the mob and the large sign of the newspaper office shared the same fate, despite the efforts of the police. A young man who attempted to defend the utterances of the Press-Post was badly beaten. American journals are filled with incidents in which the temper of the people has been aroused against many in various parts of the country who have dared to speak against the martyred President, or have expressed Anarchistic sentiments. In some cases tar and feathers with a free ride on a rail, in other cases imprisonment or summary violence has been inflicted on this class of offenders.

Sunday, 15th September was the date fixed by Lord Kitchener's proclamation, after which Boer leaders and commanders who did not surrender would be subject to permanent banishment. It was also the date after which the private property of Boers in the field will be chargeable with the support of their wives and children who are being fed and clothed by the British. The same date was afterward fixed by the Boer proclamations as the beginning of a new departure in which they threatened to kill all the British whom they catch. Since then, unfortunately, occurred the fatal ambush reported in our despatches of yesterday followed by the threatened invasion of Natal. And so— The war that for a space did fall Now trebly thundering, awails the gale. It may be the sooner ended for this renewed activity although it is clear that proclamations cannot end it.
