SUMMERSIDE CURLERS CAPTURE 2 TROPHIES

Beat Montague Hockey Club 6-3 Last Night To Take Two-game Series By 8-3 Count

Led by the sensational net minding of their goalie Mt. Stewart Royals last night advanced to the final for the Island Intermediate hockey title against Summerside Crystals when they beat Montague Hockey Club 6-3 in the second game of the series to take the round by an 8-3 count, Royals having previously won the opening game at Montague by a 2-0 score.

Gaboury And Regal Flour Cups Won By Visiting Rinks; Local Club Retains MacArthur

Summerside curlers yesterday carried off the lion's share of the trophies played for at the local curling rink when they were successful in winning the Regal Flour Junior Trophy and the Gaboury Cup in the big bonspiel staged here in which rinks from Summerside, Charlottetown and Montague took part.

Played on a keen sheet of ice despite the mild weather all matches on the long schedule of games—there were 14 matches played in all—produced keen competition and some brilliant curling before the ultimate winners were decided.

All matches were decided on a total score basis. Summerside in capturing the Gaboury Trophy chalked up a total of 70 points to Charlottetown's 51 and Montague's 49. The MacArthur Trophy remained in the trophy room of the local club when two rinks skipped by Dr. Heath McIntyre and Phil Cobb chalked up 26 points against the Summerside rinks total of 21 while in the Regal Flour play Montague had the tough luck of losing to Summerside by one point in the final total, despite the fact that the Montague rinks won both their matches while Summerside were splitting theirs. The Regal local club champions lost both their matches.

With three rinks from each club taking part in the Gaboury Trophy play interest was very keen as to the outcome. At the conclusion of the first round Charlottetown rinks led with 23 points, Summerside 21 and Montague 17. On the second round however the picture changed completely with Summerside taking a six point lead with 45 points, Charlottetown second with 39 and Montague still trailing with 32. The result was entirely up to the final round but Summerside continuing their steady curling chalked up 25 more points to their total against 17 for Montague and 12 for Charlottetown to win by a comfortable margin.

In the MacArthur Trophy play two rinks from the Summerside and Charlottetown clubs took the ice, Montague not entering a rink as they had been previously defeated by Charlottetown in an early season match. Phil Cobb's rink pitted against R. S. P. Jardine's rink led by winning the first three ends and although Summerside threatened in the early stages the Cobb-skipped team chalked up 9 points to their opponents three on the last six ends of the 14-end match to win 15 to 8.

In the other match of the competition W. A. Currie's rinks chalked up a big five on the final end edged out Dr. H. McIntyre's rink 13 to 11 after the losers had led practically all the way. Charlottetown however retained the trophy with a point total of 26 to their opponents' 21.

The Regal Flour trophy produced some stirring competition. First two teams to take to the ice were Walter Pickard's Beginners against A. G. Parks' Montague rink. Winning the

first three ends Montague saw the Pickard rink rally to take the lead on the sixth but in the last five ends Montague again raced to the front as they outscored their opponents 10 to 7.

Montague and Summerside met in the second match with Montague by virtue of a three on the eleventh ending 12-10 over the P. D. Morrison skipped Summerside rink. Meeting in the final match Charlottetown and Summerside staged a neck and neck battle for their first half of the encounter but Summerside taking four of the last six and chalking up a big four on the last end just edged out the Allan Caplan team 24 to 23 in the total points to capture the trophy and awards that go to the members of the winning rink.

On conclusion of the Bonspiel President W. W. Lord presented the two trophies to the Summerside rinks. Dr. W. Robinson, M. L. A. of Sids being presented with the Gaboury Trophy and skip Morrison of Summerside being presented with the Regal Flour cup emblem. The Island Junior championship President Lord congratulated the winners on their fine showing while both Mr. Robinson and Mr. Morrison replied with brief words of appreciation for the fine manner in which they had been treated during their visit and the manner in which the day's Bonspiel had been conducted.

Alberta Rink Wins From Defending Champions As Dominion Tankard Begins

WINNIPEG, March 4—(CP)—Northern Ontario and Manitoba were the only undefeated rinks in the 1940 Macdonald's Brier Canadian Curling Competition tonight after the former whipped Nova Brunswick 13-7 and Manitoba trounced Prince Edward Island 19-4 in the second round.

Winnipeg curling fans welcomed the national classic to the West for the first time with a crowd of 1,800 at the Amphitheatre rink. Premier John Bracken of Manitoba threw the first rock with Premier Thane Campbell of Prince Edward Island holding the broom to open the Bonspiel.

Most important victory of the two-round opening day's program was Alberta's 12-7 upset of Saskatchewan Campbell of Prince Edward Island holding the broom to open the Bonspiel.

In other matches tonight British Columbia smothered Nova Scotia 10-4 and Saskatchewan trimmed Quebec 16-7. Quebec and Prince Edward Island were the only rinks without a victory.

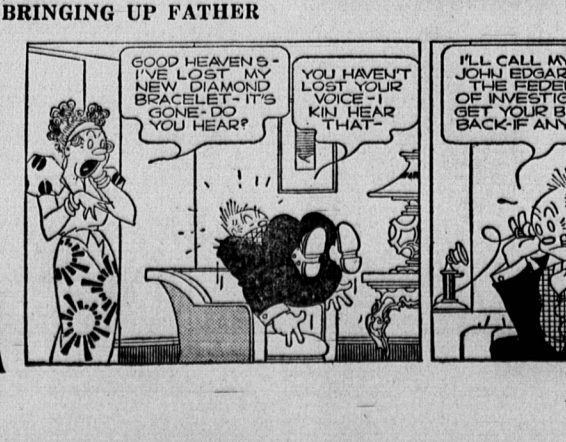
