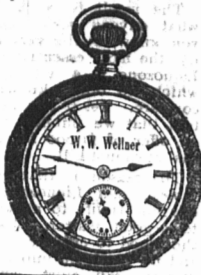

**POWNAL METHODIST CHURCH**

About ninety years ago religious services were commenced in the home of John Brehan, at Alexandra Lot 49. Those services were the beginning of what under the blessing of God developed into the Pownal Methodist Church. Those cottage services were greatly benefited by the labours of devoted laymen from Charlottetown. Particular mention may be made of Col. Evans, Messrs Matthew Smith (now Rev.) Welsh and Boyle, in connection with whose labors a glorious revival took place. About 1830, the first Pownal Church was built, which at the time formed a part of the Charlottetown circuit. With the new church, there was an increase of interest and zeal in the cause of God. Of this church it may be said "This and that man was born there." In 1846 Pownal became a separate circuit. About twenty years later it was found that the first church was too small for the numbers who wished to worship there, so that steps were taken toward the erection of a new and larger church. In 1870, the present fine and commodious church was dedicated to the worship of God. The church is beautifully situated in the pretty village of Pownal, and with its symmetrical proportions—substantial tower, and tall spire, presents a fine appearance.

This church was kindly remembered at the first of the present year by Dr. Mellish, formerly of Pownal (which is his native place) but now of Charlottetown, who presented the church with a beautiful and costly silver communion service. The following ministers have been stationed on the Pownal circuit, from the time it became a separate circuit to the present, viz:
