MARITIME EXHIBITION.

It has been suggested by a Nova Scotian newspaper that one exhibition be held annually for the three Maritime Provinces. To this plan objection in naturally taken by stock raisers in this province who would not care to go to the trouble and expense of preparing and transporting their stock to the mainland unless they can exhibit at two exhibitions in one year, as for instance, at Halifax and St. John, or at Charlottetown and St. John. In other words there ought to be two fairs held yearly both of which should be for the Maritime Provinces.

How they should be apportioned would be a matter for discussion and arrangement, but it should be borne in mind that P. E. Island sustains a position in the matter of agriculture and live stock that is quite in advance of its proportionate population as compared with the sister Provinces.

As a suggestion, let us take three year periods, beginning with 1898. Let us suppose that Nova Scotia shall have one of the two exhibitions every year; New Brunswick two years out of three and P. E. Island one year out of three. In the two seasons past Nova Scotia and New Brunswick have each had their show. The plan we propose would give the following arrangement for the years to come:

- 1900 Nova Scotia and P. E. Island.
 - 1901 Nova Scotia and New Brunswick.
 - 1902 Nova Scotia and New Brunswick.
 - 1903 Nova Scotia and P. E. Island.
- And so on indefinitely in succeeding years.

It is expected that Ontario will furnish three companies of 125 men each for the Canadian contingent. They will come respectively from the Toronto, London, and Ottawa districts. Montreal will furnish an English company and Quebec a French Canadian company. Manitoba, the North west and British Columbia are together expected to furnish one company, Nova Scotia one, and New Brunswick and P. E. Island together one company. A St John despatch to the Halifax Chronicle says that New Brunswick will supply about 80 men and P. E. Island the remaining 45 to make up a company. The Chronicle reports Nova Scotia as "responding slowly" having down to Wednesday night last but 57 names in (besides officers) and that it is doubtful whether more than half of them would pass the medical test. This does not speak well for the Minister of Militia's own Province.

The political campaign in the Murray Harbor District, consequent upon the acceptance of the Attorney Generalship by Hon. D. A. McKinnon was opened on Monday evening last, by a very large meeting in the hall at Murray Harbor South. The Attorney General spoke at length and was followed by Mr. George B. Aitken, Mr. Arthur Peters and Mr. Charles Sencabaugh on the Liberal side and by Mr. A. A. Prowse, candidate, Mr. Alex. Martin M. P., W. McKinnon M. P. P. and Mr. A. A. McLean on the Conservative side. On Tuesday evening a very large meeting was held at Montague, which was addressed by the Attorney General, Mr. A. A. Prowse Premier Farquharson, Mr. Cyrus Shaw, Mr. A. Peters, Mr. A. McLean, Dr. Robertson, M. P., H. D. Gordon and Mr. M. McKinnon. At these meetings the cause of the Provincial Government and of the Opposition were fully presented by the speakers on both sides who received the close attention of the large number of electors and others present.
