D. P. LEONARD, representing Chesebro Bros, wholesale fish dealers, No. 1 Fulton Fish Market, New York, arrived yesterday by the Halifax and will remain here till the 25th. In conversation with The Guardian Mr. Leonard said that last year was the first venture for the firm in the Island trade. The Island smelts were such high class goods, however, that the firm has made a specialty of them. This year their facilities for handling are double those of last year. The present outlook is excellent for this Province. Mr. Leonard has just made a tour of the Maine smelt centres and reports that the products there will only be a 10% of last season. N. B. shipments, also promise to be inferior, as they were last winter. All these conditions make the Island outlook bright as the stock here is nearly all No. 1's or Extras. The duty is the same as last year viz on packages less than 100 lbs, 30% ad valorem, and valuation by Customs House officers at Vancorbora is as follows:—on Extras 8 cts, on No. 1's 6 cts, and on No. 2's 5 cts, on packages of 100 lbs or over 1 of a cent per pound. Great care should be used in invoicing smelts and no smelts should be invoiced at a less value for respective grades than the law specifies. Mr. Leonard will make headquarters at Queen Hotel, city and Strathcona Hotel, Summerside and any letters addressed there for shipping stencils or other information will receive immediate attention.

NEWS FROM THE EAST

November has come in fine and mild, and favorable for outside labor. Roads are good as mid-summer and still utilized by the sports to speed their trotters. The crops are gathered. Oats, wheat and hay are an average yield, potatoes and turnips above the average. The unprecedented shortage of a year ago, is, and will be felt for some time, as every year has its own wants to settle, besides settling the back scores of a bad season like the last one. Fishing looks a little better. Squid has struck on the south side, giving the fishermen there a chance to utilize their trawls while cod are reported abundant at the very East Point. Thanks to the fish dryer at Souris a market for them is assured, and an addition to the fishermen's income, sorely needed through the disappearance of mackerel.

Rev. Mr. Gardner has declined the call to Gagetown, N. B., and enters upon the sixth year of his pastorate amongst us. He brings the culture, the scholarship and refinement of the schools of England, the high sense of duty and unquestioned patriotism of the Saxon to us, who separated from the old land and its traditions for nearly a century, may have nearly forgotten its high ideals in the strenuous life, in our struggle, built up a Greater Britain, largely Celtic, extending from the Atlantic to the Pacific.
