At the time of writing they had seven hours of daylight, while the light of the moon made the nights almost as bright as day. ### New Star Discovered.

Boston March, 13.—From an examination of the Draper Memorial photographs, at Harvard observatory, Mrs. Fleming has discovered a new star in the constellation Sagittarius.

It was too faint to be photographed on 80 plates taken between Oct. 18, 1888, and Oct. 27, 1897, although stars as faint as the 15th magnitude appear on some of them. It appears on eight photographs taken while it was bright. On March 8, 1898, it was of the fifth magnitude, and on April 29, 1898, of the eighth magnitude.

A plate taken yesterday morning shows that the star is still visible, and is of the 10th magnitude. Two photographs show that its spectrum resembles those of other new stars. Fourteen bright lines are shown, six of them due to hydrogen. The entire number of new stars discovered since 1885 is six, of which five have been found by Mrs. Fleming.

## Chinaman Serves on a Jury.

Fort Scott, Kas., March 13.—Sam Wah, the only Chinaman in this city, was compelled to act as a jurymen with five negroes in a case brought by Mary Epps to recover \$100 from Ben Bruce on a contract for removing "spooks" from two of the defendant's houses. Both parties are negroes and the attorneys agreed to try the case before a jury of negroes and the one Chinaman.

When summoned Sam Wah refused to go and an attachment was issued for him. The orders of the court had no terrors for the laundryman and the officer was obliged to use force to get him into court. He asserted his right under the constitution not to take an oath except after the manner of swearing in his native country and the court was compelled to order a chicken brought in and killed after the Chinese form of solemnizing an oath, which satisfied the Chinaman, who took his seat with the other jurors, but refused to remove his cap.

The unnaturalized juror took much interest in the case and seemed unwilling to return a verdict for the defendant upon instructions from the court that her contract to perform the work was not legal.
