## McCURDY TELLS OF KEY WEST TO HAVANA TRIP

of his aeroplane. When the aviator discovered that he must descend he was at an altitude of 1500 feet and the sea was immediately beneath him. He felt no fear he said and immediately started to volplane down until he reached the surface of the water. The pontoons proved abundantly buoyant McCurdy not even wetting his feet. He dropped into the sea which was warm and smooth, and with the loss of but a few minutes he was picked up by the crew of the United States Steamer Terry which has been assigned to the task of marking the course of the flight.

It is said but four minutes elapsed between the time that McCurdy hit the water and the moment he was rescued.

When McCurdy landed on the surface of the sea he retained his seat and seemed not at all dismayed by his experience. On the contrary he was laughing when he stepped aboard the destroyer where he was given an enthusiastic welcome by those on board. The first to grasp his hand and extend congratulations was President Gomez of Cuba, who was a guest on board the Terry.

"I was confident that I was going to reach my goal without mishap until I discovered that my supply of lubricating oil had begun to fail. From that time on, my sole desire was to overtake the destroyer Pauld which was steaming full speed ahead just in front of me. I grew despondent over the thought that I must descend. However, I made up my mind that the only thing to do was to give it up for the time being and I came down to the surface of the water alighting so smoothly that even my smoking tobacco that I carried in my pocket was not even moistened.

"I had enjoyed every mile of the flight up to that time. The trouble was that in some unaccountable way my oil tank became punctured and much of the oil leaked out and was lost.

"When I found that I was running short my motors were working splendidly and there is no question in the world, but that I could have reached Havana and my proposed landing at Cape Columbia with great ease.

"When the aeroplane was taken aboard the destroyer and examined it was found that one of the planes had been broken when it touched the water. For this reason the machine must go back to the factory for repairs."
