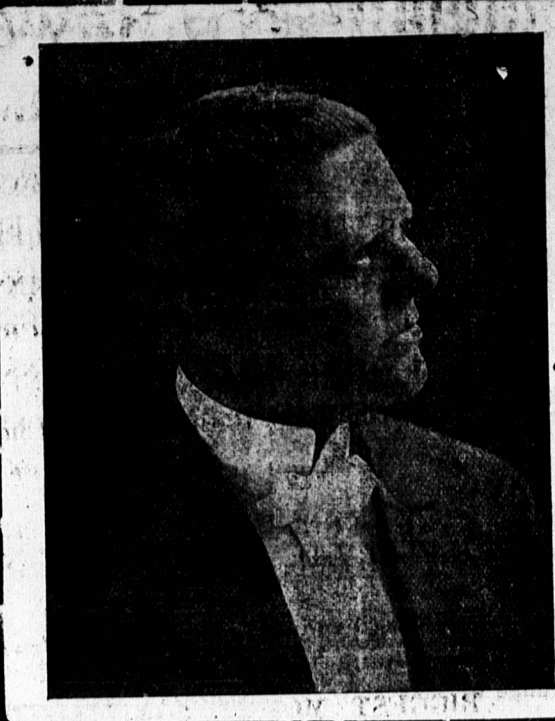

Indignation Meeting At Green Bay Poll
 The electors of Green Bay school district held a meeting in the school house on Wednesday evening, Dec. 8th, to discuss the tax question and other political matters. There was a large attendance and the audience were unanimous in their condemnation of the Bell Government and especially of the Taxation Act. The sitting member, Mr. C. W. Crosby, was severely criticised, many of the speakers recalling the promises he made during the election campaign. He had stated distinctly that the taxes would not be increased, but more than likely, would be decreased; the school teachers would receive a straight salary paid out of revenue with all supplements and bonuses done away with. When asked if the revenue of the province would be sufficient for these things without increasing taxation, Mr. Crosby stated that it would, when a lot of the useless officials were dispensed with and the expenditures of the province carried out with proper economy. How have these promises been kept? (A voice from the back of the hall, "Ask the Patriot.") The speaker went on to enumerate the fulfillment of the various promises. At the first session of the legislature, they appointed a brand new set of officials called road inspectors; then the new Education Act was passed and it was found that any increase in the teachers salaries must be paid by the districts direct in addition to their regular taxation. The school business has gone from bad to worse, as a matter of fact, for this district, one hundred and twenty-five worse. Then came another batch of officials called valuers, appointed to get a new valuation of our farms. These new officials are not in the game for their health; it is quite a game for them but it reminds one of the little boy who was sticking pins in the frog. It was great fun for the boy but death for the frog; we are the frog. The salary of our unworthy representative was raised by a considerable amount although before the election he was quite willing to take the job at the old salary; now he has \$300 added to his salary for breaking his promise to the electors, and \$300 added to his salary as Commissioner of Public Works, so that he costs the country \$1100 more than any of his predecessors in office. To meet all these new expenses for new officials and for increased salaries for useless officials, the country is taxed beyond all reason and, as if the additional land and income taxes were not sufficient they have handed us a poll tax of \$3 each.
 After considerable discussion, in which not a voice was raised in excuse for the government, a resolution was adopted protesting against the unjust and unnecessary increase in taxation.
